body upon its arrival at the castle, said the King had been dead at least eight hours, placing the time of the accident before 8 p.m.

Several thousand people were massed at Laeken at 4 p.m. when the Minister of Justice solemnly read the official statement announcing King Albert's death.

Signs of grief were seen everywhere for King Albert was one of the most popular monarchs of modern times. Thousands of inhabitants crowded the streets.

During the afternoon the Government issued a proclamation, in formally informing the nation, in words of deep love and affection, that the King was dead.

On the eve of his departure for Toronto, Mr. S. R. Finlayson, manager for the past two years of the Charlottetown branch of the Bank of Montreal, was guest of honour at an enjoyable dinner tendered by representatives of the business men of the city.

The chief address was delivered by Premier MacMillan, who was followed by His Worship Mayor Kennedy and other speakers.

While the function was in progress, a presentation of a handsome bouquet of roses was sent to Mr. Finlayson, as a reminder of the esteem and respect in which he is held by his Charlottetown friends.
