**Twenty Thousand Farm Laborers Wanted.**

The Manitoba Government advises that it will require at least twenty thousand farm laborers to harvest the enormous wheat crop of Manitoba and Assinabola this season, and in order to supply this demand the Canadian Pacific Railway has completed arrangements with the Intercolonial, Dominion Atlantic, Canada Eastern and P. E. I. Rys. to run farm laborers' excursions to every point in Manitoba or Assinabola west, southwest and northwest of Winnipeg as far as and including Moose Jaw, Esplanade, and Yorkton at rate of \$10.00 for the going trip. Second class tickets will be issued from points east of New Glasgow on August 9th and from points west of New Glasgow on August 19th, and with each ticket agent will furnish verification blank which will be deposited with ticket agent where he secures work and when this certificate has been signed by the party for whom he has been working, it will entitle the original purchaser to a ticket to return to his starting point in the Maritime Provinces at rate of \$18.00 any time previous to November 15th 1901.

On this trip tickets will be issued to females as well as males, but will not be issued at half fare to children, and 150 lbs. of baggage, wearing apparel only, will be allowed on each full ticket.

Late advices state that harvesting operations will commence on August 10th.

**OUR P. E. ISLAND COLLEGE PRESIDENT BROUGHT TO TASK.**

The remark lately made by Dr. Schurman, of Cornell on the superiority of Europe to America in intellectual activities, has called forth considerable comment. Professor Henry Van Dyke, one of Princeton's eminent men, thus comments on the utterances of our distinguished P. E. Islander:

"On the general proposition that America is intellectually inferior to Europe, I would first question the fact and then confess my inability to explain the cause. It seems to me that there is nothing being done in England at present either in the way of criticism, fiction or poetry, which is superior to what is being done in this country, with the possible exception of Stephen Philip in dramatic literature, which is of great promise.

It is an ideal thing to say that we have no Shakespeare's Dantes, or Milton's at present. Great geniuses are not produced to order, and when they do come their own age seldom recognizes them. I doubt whether the University professors and heads of Colleges at Cambridge and Oxford knew anything about Shakespeare when he was alive. Certainly they did not think much of Milton in his day, each represent moment fiction is the leading form of literary activity, and here I think we can hold our own with England beyond question. In criticism it would be easy to name four Americans whose work is not excelled, and, to my mind, not quite equalled by anything being done in England."

**THE FIRST THERMOMETER.**

The first sealed thermometer was made some time prior to 1654 by Ferdinand II., Grand Duke of Tuscany. He filled the bulb and part of the tube with alcohol, and then sealed the tube by melting the glass tip, says The Engineer. There appears to be considerable doubt as to who first employed mercury as a thermometric liquid; the Academia del Cimento used such an instrument in 1657, and they were known in Paris in 1659. Fahrenheit, however, appears to have been the first to construct, in 1714, mercury thermometers having trustworthy scales. The use of the boiling point of water as the upper fixed point, was suggested by Carlo Renzibini in 1709.

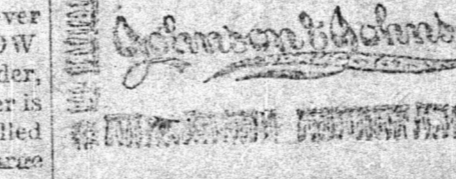
