### THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)  
MONTREAL, Que., May 27.—Prices of bran and shorts were reduced \$1 per ton today on the Montreal market. Butter prices were reduced on the produce market, eastern townships no. 1 being offered at 28 1/2 cents per pound; down half a cent from yesterday. Increasing production of Canadian butter and continued disinclination of buyers to purchase beyond immediate needs, was stated to be responsible for the weaker feeling. Receipts were 920 boxes. Prices to the retail trade were unchanged today following yesterday's reduction. Lower prices also prevailed on the cheese market with westerns quoted as low as 16 1/2 cents per pound waxed and easterns at 18 1/2 cents per pound waxed. Receipts were 5,234 boxes. On the egg market too, a weaker sentiment prevailed with dealers reluctant to buy. Receipts were 7,257 cases. Potatoes were lowered in price and New Brunswick's selling at \$1.65 to \$1.75 and Quebec's at \$1.50 in bulk per 90 pounds new no. 1 grade, were slightly firmer at \$9 per 150 pound barrels, but no. 2 grade new dropped to \$5.75 per 150 pounds.
