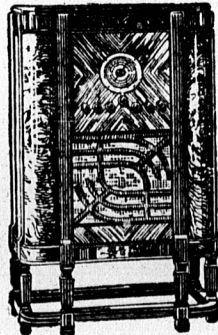

Case Believed Unparalleled In Medical History

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Oct. 19—A 17 year old mother, suffering from infantile paralysis, gave birth to a baby while lying in a respirator in hospital here today. The case was believed here to be unparalleled in medical history. The baby, eight weeks premature, weighed two pounds, nine ounces. Attending physicians reported tonight the mother, whose name was not divulged, was doing "as well as can be expected." The baby was given a "fair chance" to live. Hospital authorities said the mother has been in the respirator since Sept. 3. Her case was complicated Oct. 14 when she contracted a cold. During the delivery of the baby, oxygen was administered when it was necessary to remove her from the respirator for three brief periods.

Island - born Doctor Passes At Newton

NEWTON, Mass., Oct. 19—(CP)—Dr. Ewan Alexander Robertson, 71, for 12 years a practising physician in this city and owner and superintendent of the Woodlawn Sanatorium died suddenly yesterday at his home in West Newton. Born in Farmington, P. E. I. in 1867, he graduated from the Chattanooga Medical college in 1905 and later studied in Germany and England. A specialist in neurology and psychiatry he was a member of the New England Society of Psychiatry and a fellow of the American Medical Association. He is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Sturges Harvis and Mrs. James Morson, Brookline, Mass and Mrs. H. W. Keefe of Rollo Bay, P. E. I., whom he visited almost every summer. Funeral services will be held tomorrow.

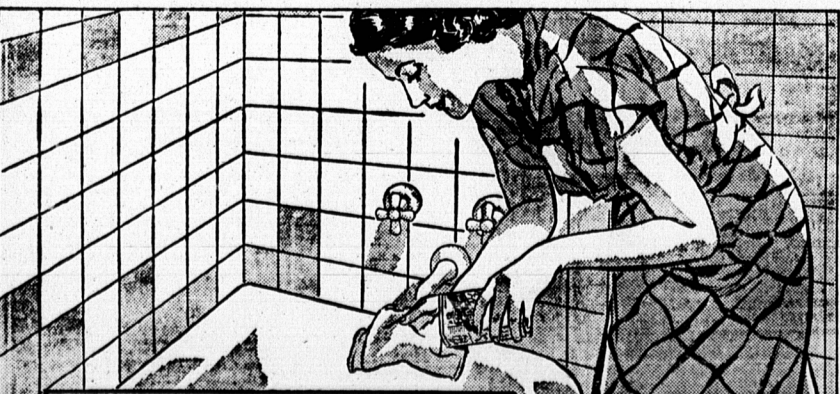

Went to Bed With Boots on

There has always been considerable controversy as to who built the first sleeping car. Records would seem to show that the first efforts were the adoption of a day coach to sleeping car purposes in 1836 on the Cumberland Valley Railroad of Pennsylvania. The first "Pullman" is said to have made its appearance in 1859. In the first make-shift sleeping cars, passengers went to bed fully clothed and reclined on rough mattresses with their own blankets or shawls drawn over them. In referring to the inaugural trip of the first "Pullman," the conductor J. L. Barnes said "there was no crowd and the car, lighted by candles, moved away in solitary grandeur, if such it might be called. I remember the first night I had to request the passengers to take their boots off before they got into their berths. They wanted to keep them on—seemed afraid to take them off."
In Canada, the Grand Trunk Railway, now part of the Canadian National System, gave early attention to the matter of sleeping cars. There was strong objection at first due to some unfavorable experiences on American lines but the matter was settled for the time by introducing benches of bunks

running the whole length of the car and without any curtains or divisions. A rug and a small pillow were the only extras furnished. Today the modern all-steel sleeping cars on the Canadian National System is the last word in comfort, with air-conditioning and other improvements.

Bread

Being the Popular Report (1937-38) of the British and Foreign Bible Society, by the Rev. John A. Patten, M. C., M. A., its Literary Superintendent.
The Popular Report of this world-wide Society, under the caption "Bread," maintains the high level of all past issues. Mr. Patten bases his report on the general principle, "Whether he knows it or not, man is hungry, and that hunger can only be satisfied by heavenly food." With this truth as guiding principle this little book essays to tell the story of how the Bible Society supplies to needy multitudes of men and women of many races and languages "the Bread of Life."
The headings of the chapters give an indication of the attractive way in which the whole subject is treated: "Bread for the British People," "Distributors of the Bread," "Bread for the Multitude," "The Same Bread: The Story of Translation," and "The

Price of Bread.

The bare outline of these headings is filled out with apposite literary quotations, including a characteristic line from Rupert Brooke, "The strong crust of friendly bread." This moving account of the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society throughout the world is written with Four Hundred Years of the Open Bible in English, and all that it has meant and can mean to that race, as its great background.
The romance of the Society's progress since 1804 is never lost sight of, and like a golden thread through the report runs the fundamental idea that the Bible Society's one aim is to place in the hands of men "the Bread of Life."
Due acknowledgment is made of the assistance given to the Society by the nations of the British Commonwealth, and Canada, and its contribution is given honourable mention. The story of the work in its appeal, and the gifted author very clearly indicates the vital need of increased resources if the Society is to maintain and extend its world-wide mission.
In this Four Hundredth Year of the Open Bible in English, the Society, though still faced with a deficit, seems confident that its appeal will find a response from all vitally interested in the Christian Missionary Enterprise, and in giving to the peoples of the world

the one Book that can truthfully be described as "the Bread of Life"
