

Presbytery Of P. E. I. Meets At Clifton

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in the New London Presbyterian Church on Thursday at 5 p. m. There was a good attendance of ministers and elders from all parts of the island.

Considerable attention was given to the resignation of the Rev. Fred Williamson from the Malpeque pulpit. Representatives from Malpeque expressed their desire to retain Mr. Williamson's services. It was with great reluctance that the Presbytery finally accepted the resignation.

A committee of five will be responsible for the details of Miss Marion McLean's designation service during Christmas week. The committee members are Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. G. Legate, Mr. A. A. McDonald, Rev. John McNeil, and Mr. A. E. Morrison.

The postponed induction of Rev. A. S. McLellan as Caledonia is expected to take place as soon as Mr. McLellan's release can be secured from the Presbytery of Cape Breton.

The matter of restoring the old Gordon home was carefully discussed. It was decided that very definite steps must be taken to put the structure into proper shape as a Presbyterian historical site.

Quiet Prevails On Parliament Hill

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—(CP)—Absence of Prime Minister MacKenzie King on a holiday visit to Flor de has brought an outward air of quiet to Parliament Hill but within the departmental offices there is the customary pre-session activity.

So far as could be learned no date has been fixed for opening Parliament but that decision may have been reached before the Prime Minister left, and will be announced at what the Government considers the proper time.

Generally it is believed the opening will be Jan. 13 or 20 but there has been no official intimation other than that the date would be in January. Since there has been no increase in the number of cabinet meetings and probably will not be until after Christmas—the later date is most likely—possibly the last Thursday in the month.

Prof. Blanchard Addresses Hope River Study Club

Professor J. H. Blanchard, M. A., vice-principal of Prince of Wales College, addressed a meeting of the St. Ann's study club at Hope River and outlined the economic struggle in this province up to the present day.

Professor Blanchard referred to the large shipbuilding industry carried on in Prince Edward Island from 1860 to 1890. In 1864 130 vessels were built in the province which provided employment for approximately 4,000 people with an additional 2,000 engaged in the coastal trade, records revealed.

Rev. George McCormack of St. Dunstan's Basilica staff, spoke on credit unions and co-operative societies. Mr. L. P. MacDonald, Charlottetown, Secretary of St. Dunstan's credit union and Mr. E. J. H. Morrissey, Charlottetown, Secretary of the Liguorian credit union, also spoke.

bers of men and women who could neither read nor write. There was one bright spot on the education horizon, however, and that was the apparently increased interest in education by the members of the adult education movement. More than 300 study clubs had been formed during the last winter.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan

When children complete their training in the schools and later in the colleges of this Province they did not have to take second place to those from any other Province in Canada, Hon. Dr. MacMillan declared in a short address in which he congratulated people of the district on their new school.

Although there was some illiteracy here there was not so much as in the other Provinces, Dr. MacMillan believed. In many cases those classed as illiterates had been taken from school to make a living and help keep other members of the family in school. Many owed their high place in business and professions to the sacrifice of other members of the family, a fact which they should not forget.

Has Respect For Teachers

He had a great deal of respect for the teachers of the Province whose work was to instill into the pupils the rudiments of an education. There seemed to be a growing feeling that the education system needed some revision. That might be possible, the speaker believed, and no doubt a solution would be found eventually. He believed the young generation would see even greater changes in the next 25 years, a period which had seen more development than any other similar period in world history, not all of it for the best.

Need of co-operation of parents and teachers was stressed. Dr. MacMahon referred to the assistance a Women's Institute could be to a school "but let the men work too." If they did that he did not see how it could be anything but a wonderful success.
