Only Italian On P. E. Island Visits Medford

(From Medford Mercury)

Out of a population of 87,000 people, but one man of Italian birth and parentage can be found, and this is on Prince Edward Island.

Frank Vuozzo, a native of Atty, Joseph J. Launie of 25 Fountain St., whom he is visiting at the present time, has that unique distinction. As a rule the country is too cold for people of the Latin races, but Mr. Vuozzo appears to thrive there both from the standpoint of health and business success.

He has resided on the Island for the past 20 years, leaving Boston five years after his marriage to a girl of English extraction. For 15 years he has been living with his wife and family at Montague, P. E. I., where he has a barber business and a fishing industry. Most of the products of the industry are shipped to Boston and New York.

For nine years, since his last visit to Medford, Mr. Vuozzo has not heard one word in Italian. Naturally his visit here proved most interesting and enjoyable, and at every opportunity he spoke his native tongue. He returns to his family this evening at Montague, a town called by the inhabitants "Prince Edward's Island Garden of the Gulf."

Although Mr. Vuozzo was born in Cassano, Italy, and is a Canadian subject, he learned his trade in Boston. He has three children who are only half Italian as their mother is English.

Mr. Vuozzo said that he would be glad to get back home as the pace in Boston is too swift. Most of his neighbors are Scotch, but he finds them very pleasant.

Fire Destroys C. P. R. Buildings

(Canadian Press)

EDMUNDSTON, N. B., Jan. 4 - The Canadian Pacific Railway lost all its buildings by fire here early this morning. The blaze broke out in the station building and spread to the freight shed and express office. All were totally destroyed. The fire fortunately was confined to the railway property, although other buildings were situated not far from the burning C. P. R. buildings.

The fire broke out at about three o'clock, not long before the biggest storm of the winter set in. The buildings were wooden and old. The fire spread rapidly before a brisk wind. The express building and the freight shed contained considerable quantities of goods in transit. The total loss is estimated at \$100,000.

PROBLEM FOR GOVERNMENT

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 4-Canada is holding an amount of \$12,000,000 approximately, derived from the sequestration of enemy property in the Dominion during the Great War, it is learned. The question of the disposition of this money is one which will probably engage the attention of the Dominion Government in the near future. In certain quarters, the opinion is held that the amount should be returned to the owners of the confiscated property.

Nearly \$10,000,000 of the total sum, which has been placed by Canada in a special account, was obtained from the sale of securities and properties in the Dominion belonging to German citizens. Of the remainder, \$1,200,000 was secured from the sale of sequestered Austrian property of citizens of Hungary and about \$40,000 from the sale of securities and property in Canada of Bulgarians.

CANADA IS THANKED BY LEEWARD ISLANDS

OTTAWA, Jan. 4-The Canadian Government has received a communication from Major W. H. Peebles, Commissioner of Montserrat, Leeward Islands, expressing the deep appreciation and gratitude of the Government of Montserrat for the help rendered by Canada in the distress following the hurricane of September, 1928. The Commissioner enclosed a copy of a resolution passed by the Legislature Council of Montserrat, expressing thanks.

Following the disastrous hurricane which swept the West Indies last summer, the British West Indies Hurricane Relief Fund was organized. The Government of Canada made a contribution of \$25,000 and a considerable number of private contribu-

tions were also made. The Canadian Red Cross was active in connection with the relief work. The Dominion Government sent one of its Assistant engineers of the Public Works Department to the scene of the disaster to assist in the work of reconstruction.
