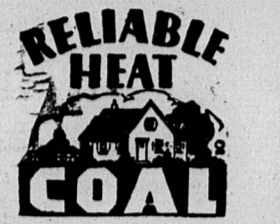

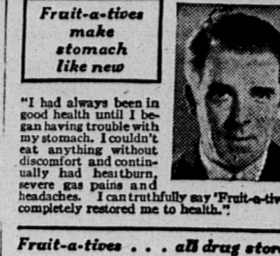

Among them were ways and means of helping the poor this winter; improving the United Prayer Services, and getting more co-operation from the different congregations. COURT NEWS—Mr. George M. Matthews, Stipendiary Magistrate for Prince County held Court in Summerside on Thursday. Two men charged with driving a motor vehicle without a permit pleaded guilty and were each fined \$2 and costs. A man charged with vagrancy was sentenced to six months in jail. An assault case adjourned from last week came up for hearing and occupied the attention of the Court for some hours. The case was against three Summerside parties, charged with common assault. After hearing the evidence for both sides the Magistrate dismissed the case as he considered there was not sufficient evidence to convict. Mr. W. Henry Noonan prosecuted for the Crown and Mr. Thane A. Campbell, K.C., and Mr. C. D. McCallum appeared for the defendants. All the cases were brought by the R. C. M. P.—S.

SUMMERSIDE'S LANDING FIELD—For some time past a committee from the Board of Trade have been looking into the possibility of Summerside having a landing field for aeroplanes that would come up to the requirements of the Canadian National Airways. Last week Mr. Stewart Graham, aviation inspector and Mr. George Ross, of Ottawa, and Secretary of the Canadian Flying Club Association, were in Summerside, and Mr. Graham, after inspecting the field, informed the committee that the regulation width for landing fields was 392 ft. and the length of each run way should be 1,800. The field running north and south met the requirements, but the field running West and East fell a little short of the regulation width. The committee are negotiating with the owners of the property to see whether a little more land can be procured. The matter will then be placed before the Town Council with an idea of purchasing the property.—S.

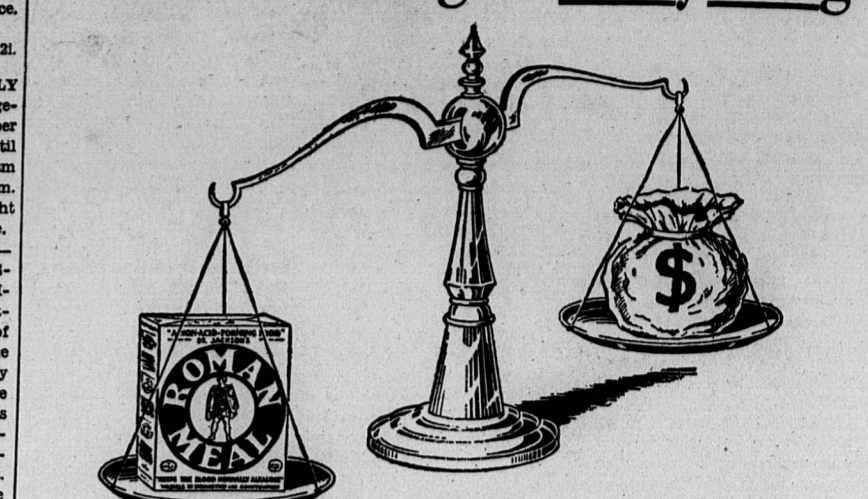
