We, without you, cannot be made perfect.

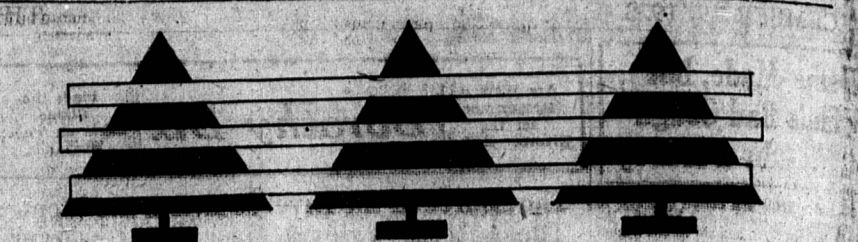

vacinated or had not suffered from diphtheria already. But with a dog so vaccinated, the dose of living poison produces only slight symptoms, sometimes none at all, because it was rendered partially immune by the first vaccination. The second vaccination makes it completely and permanently immune.

The virus is present in all cases of diphtheria.

The first inoculation of the virus is selected for treatment of the disease in which it is, in fact, the virus of diphtheria, made inactive by laboratory treatment.

The second inoculation is made after an interval of about ten days with a weak or attenuated strain of the living virus. This dose of living virus is a hundred-fold times as much as would infect any dog with diphtheria which had not been previously
