ment here, and that is that the old system of provincial subsidies from the Dominion will be revived and continued. For Nova Scotia \$600,000 per annum from the Dominion tax-payer; for New Brunswick \$300,000; for Prince Edward \$300,000. These are the figures quoted.

"Take immigration. Everybody at the Board of Trade convention was in favor of immigration. Of course, Eddie Beatty hit the nail on the head when we said we shouldn't rely on percentages as a measure of success in our immigration policy.


"Percentages," he said, "meant very little where small numbers were involved. Two is a hundred percent greater than one, but 2 and 1 are the smallest numerals.

"They passed resolutions in favor of the Maritimes getting a fair share of immigration, but that is not getting us immigrants. From this port alone, in nine months, 8,816 emigrants left for the United States. At Vancouver, on the Maine border, over 4,000 from New Brunswick were reported. The process of bleeding to death goes on. The province lost about 10,000 persons in nine months this year. We cannot afford it. We haven't the numbers. Montreal lost some citizens to the States, too, but Montreal in-

creased her population by 60,000, which is as much as the whole population of this city.

"Another good thing Eddie Beatty said was that it seemed as if Providence, realizing the governmental impotency which existed during the past six years and our lack of industrial prosperity, decided that it would be particularly good to us and sent four crops, good either in quantity or money value, but, he said, we were not justified in relying entirely on the intervention of Providence.

"I don't swallow all that E. W. Beatty says, for much of it is made in Montreal, but he tied himself up in the urgent necessity of immigration, and with that we all thoroughly agree."

"As I am a religious man I virtually believed that our small band of Americans were spared so that we could rescue the great legion of helpless orphans. The terrific seismic forces ceased temporarily and we succeeded in reaching the orphanages.

"Due to three years of systematic drill and discipline the children had already begun to dress and formed lines. Within a few minutes we marched them all out in orderly formation to the adjacent fields.

"An hour later the earth rocked again, followed by a rolling, rushing sound like thunder which seemed to carry utter doom and destruction with it. The orphans clung pathetically to the nurses, whose superb courage and composure in such dire extremity would touch the hearts of the people who sent them here.

"A hurricane of wind swept everything before it and the orphans who were only scantily clad, trembled from combined cold and fear.

There is another suggestion which affects the C. N. R. This has to do with the boat service between the mainland and P. E. I. It is recommended that the service be increased and that the cost be charged to the country and not to the C. N. R. One rather interesting point which is made in the report is that in the commission's opinion the union of the provinces would not help to surmount the various economic handicaps under which the Maritime labor—those from other sections of Canada have often tried to make the point that the union of the three provinces would prove an excellent basis upon which easterners might better obtain increased consideration at the hands of the federal authorities. The report also points out that in the upkeep of their roads and bridges those provinces have a heavy load to maintain.
