




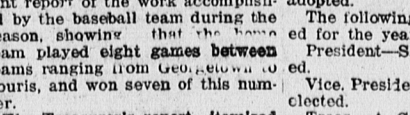

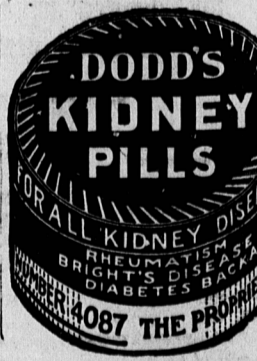
Entertainment.—H. W. MacKay, chairman; McLeod, Douglass.
