CAPE COLONY ELECTION.

The Cape Colony election has resulted in a majority of one for the Government of Sir Gordon Sprigg and the Progressive party. This is a very narrow majority but it was hardly expected that the Government could escape defeat. Sir Gordon had taken office as a Progressive, that is what from our point of view might be called the British as opposed to the Dutch or Afrikaner Bond party. But he won the support of the latter by showing marked sympathy with their views, and had lost much of his Progressive support being for some time maintained in office by his Dutch allies. Then Sir Gordon opposed a motion for a re-hearing of a number of Afrikaner claims which had been rejected, and was outvoted by a combination of Bond and Progressive votes. He determined not to resign but to appeal to the country. As the result indicates, he has apparently outgeneraled his Afrikaner opponents.

It is given out that if he can hold his majority until a redistribution of seats is made his position will be comparatively secure. At present the representation in the Cape Legislature is largely based on the territorial area of the constituencies, rather than in accordance with population. By increasing the representation of the more populous districts and decreasing that of the sparsely settled divisions it is claimed that the Progressives will be assured of a good majority. Of course Canadian sympathies will naturally run with the Progressives, but a majority of one is too narrow to count upon with any degree of certainty.

IN FAR AUSTRALIA.

The southern Commonwealth is to have a general election next month, the parliamentary term being three years. "Preferential trade for a white Australia" is Premier D.aki's battle cry, by which is meant the endorsement of a plank of Mr. Chamberlain's platform and the exclusion of Asiatic labor. The Melbourne Argus reminds the Prince Minister that in the contest at the polls the women will vote as well as the men, and the feminine electors outnumber the masculine ones. So far have our antipodean cousins outstripped us in modern progress! And there are many complicated questions at issue. Fancy all those bright Australian women at the ballot box

travely deciding upon a question of preferential trade, or whether it is best to permit the employment of Asiatic labor, or how the recurring disputes between employers and employed can best be adjusted, or whether Tumut or Bombala shall be adopted as the future capital. These are some of the questions at issue upon which the women as well as the men of Australia must vote next month, and which questions, if they are to vote intelligently they must study. Possibly some of the ladies may feel unequal to the great responsibility and others may ask themselves whether the game is worth the powder.

The Australian Parliament is divided on the vital question of the new capital. The House of Representatives want Tumut. The Senate insists upon Bombala. Either Sydney or Melbourne would be a suitable place—rich and populous etc., much larger than any in Canada—but for the Jerusalem. Samaria jealousy that exists between them. Even so it might be better to choose one or the other, were this possible, which it is not, rather than build a new capital in the wilderness. The Melbourne Argus suggests that the matter be solved by making dual capitals of Melbourne and Sydney, each to hold the honor in succession for a parliamentary term, after the experiment tried in old Canada. But this is not likely to be done, and at the best could be only a temporary expedient.

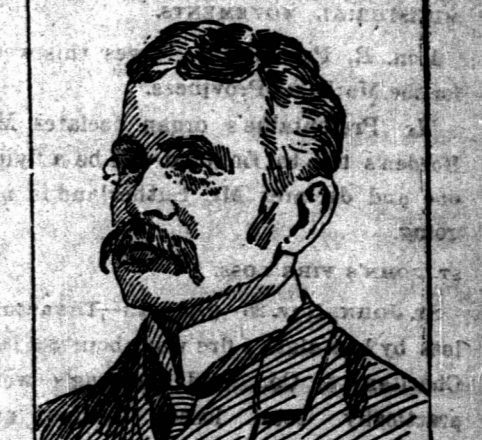
