HOW TO INSTRUCT

The Children in the Sunday School.

BY PROFESSOR HAMILL

Who Has Been Visiting the Provinces Including P. E. Island.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—Professor Hamill of Chicago gave an interesting address in Bank street church Sunday School hall yesterday afternoon on "How to Teach." That a person learns well the profession started is no reason why he should teach well. Very few are born teachers; the great mass have to learn how. Were all but born teachers, both secular and in Sunday School work, struck out, there would be very few. Take the blunderer and by patience and tuck you can in a few years make him a first-rate teacher. Any teacher in the Sunday School who is conscious of blunders will by and by become a success if he profits by his blunders and only teaches his successes. You have a public school system in your Dominion which is, I believe, better than ours in the States. You centralize and by that reason have made your system one of the best. The teachers and governments have made teaching one of the most honorable of professions, but too often do people point to the result of the public school teaching and compare it to the work done in the Sunday schools and say that we are failures. The encouragement a Sunday school teacher receives is rather of a doubtful nature. Some one comes along, pats them on the head and expresses commiseration for their hard lot. The only thing to do is to thank that person and continue in the work. Everyone has a theory and thinks it easy to teach. In teaching the teachers must be observant, for there are many short cuts. Books are necessary to successful teaching. The story method is best for the infant classes. The teacher should not be carried away by word pictures and embellish the bible stories, as the child of ten is disappointed when he reads the story from the bible. Stick to the bible, but tell the story in simple language. Encourage the child to ask questions. It is a sad day when the child is sat on for asking questions either in the home or Sunday School. The story telling is the fundamental principle of good teaching. For young men and older scholars the topical method is best. The question is often asked, why do young men leave the Sunday school? One young man out of twenty attends Sunday School or church, while the other nineteen loaf on street corners, attend baseball matches, football games, etc. In the Sunday School he is generally dealt with as a little child. The superintendent of the Sunday School of which the young man thinks himself no inconsiderable part, addresses the school with "dear children," while the teacher does the same in her class. The young man thinks, and one reason he don't go to Sunday school is because you don't give him a chance to think. Prof. Hamill has been visiting the provinces including P. E. Island.

On Saturday next, Oct. 27th, in Prince of Wales College at 3:30 p. m. the regular monthly meeting of the Women's Social Council will be held, where reports of annual meeting of National Council at Victoria, B.
