Sir Louis Davies and Miss Davies left last night for Cape Traverse. They expect to cross to-day en route to Ottawa.

Senator and Mrs. Prowse are waiting at Georgetown to cross to the mainland. The Senator goes to Ottawa and Mrs. Prowse visits in Winnipeg.

Yesterday Mr. W. E. Dennison, Moncton, representing G. F. Harvey & Co., Saratoga Springs, after waiting 10 days for the crossing of the winter steamers, went to Cape Tormentine and will cross there to-day if fine.

Mr. Herman H. Pitts of Fredericton, N. B. Past Grand Master of the L. O. A. of New Brunswick and Secretary of the Triennial Council of that Order, arrived at the Queen Hotel yesterday. Mr. Pitts is editor and proprietor of the Fredericton Reporter, and has been a member of the Legislature of his Province. He came to visit some of the Orange lodges in Prince Edward Island as a special delegate from the Grand Lodge of British North America. Mr. Pitts set out to come to the Island by way of Picton, but on arriving there and finding the steamers not running, returned to Sackville and Cape Tormentine, crossed by the ice-boats and arrived by the mail train yesterday afternoon. He was called upon last evening by a number of members of the Orange body.

By telegraphic despatches received at Malpeque on Friday last, the sad news was announced of the death of Russell Thompson, son of Archibald Thompson, Esq., of Darnley, and brother of Mrs. Robert MacGougan, of Princetown. Deceased, who had gone to Gardiner, Massachusetts, some few years ago, was in the prime of his youthful vigor, and as no particulars of his illness had been received, the shock will be indeed sudden to the sorrowing parents, brother and sisters at home. His wife and one sister, May, reside at Gardiner. Deceased was a member of Court Aberdeen L. O. F., Malpeque.

The first foreign mail received in Summerside since Monday Feb. 4th arrived here in the bag via the Capes last evening. Two government ice boats with 25 bags of mail and four opposition boats left Cape Tormentine at 8.30, and arrived on this side about 2.45 p. m. There were 17 passengers. The boats on this side did not start. The one bag of mail for Summerside came by train to Emerald connecting with regular train from Charlottetown. Again Summerside receives less than a fair proportion of her rights as while Charlottetown got 54 bags of mail the people of the Western Capital get but one and why is the whole lot so small? Why could not the Opposition boats be employed to assist in cleaning up the load? If these conditions continue to exist the boats can no more than keep up with the average daily mail, while there is any where from 700 to 900 bags of verdine mail on the other shore.

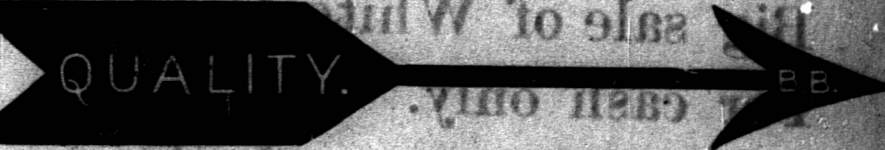
