Niagara Falls Holds Eastern Basket Title

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., April 28 (CP)—Niagara Falls Hamocs today held the Eastern Canada Intermediate basketball championship, having won their two-game total-points series with Ottawa University Saturday night 81-80 despite losing the second game 46-42. Hamocs took the first game Friday night 39-34.

The second game, watched by a crowd of 1,500, was one of the most spectacular basketball contests played here and it was not until the final two minutes that the Ontario titleholders were able to cut down the commanding lead Ottawa had built up. Hamocs sank three baskets and a foul shot to come within two points of the college team.

Ottawa sank its final field goal in the last minute to pull within one point. It was rounded but after the basket Hamocs obtained the ball and kept it until the final whistle.

Montague Loses Popular Player

Mr. Floyd McKinnon, Montague, popular centre man of the Montague Hockey Club, has been transferred to the Bank of Nova Scotia, Hampton, N. B. He will entertain for the mainland today.

For many years Floyd was pivot man for the first line of the Montague team and was one of the smoothest intermediate hockey players in the Maritimes. He also managed the team for the past few years. Hockey fans in the east will follow with interest his hockey career on the mainland next season.

On Friday evening last his many friends and teammates gathered in the I.O.O.F. Hall in Montague and tendered him a fitting farewell. An enjoyable social evening was spent with music being supplied by Miss Irma Gaudet, Miss Louise Hewitt and Mr. Arthur Carstairs.

During the course of the night an address was read by Miss Etta McLure and a presentation made by one of his teammates, Mr. Fred MacKenzie.

In paying tribute to the departing member of the hockey club the boys said, "it is with mixed feelings of happiness and regret, that we your friends leave of your impending departure from Montague. We are sincerely happy that you have received a well merited promotion in your chosen work, but our happiness is tinged with regret for the loss which your going will mean to the many friends which your pleasing personality has won for you in this community."

In closing they said, "we hope your future social and business contacts will be as pleasing and helpful to you as your past contacts have been enjoyable and valuable to us."—M.

Syracuse, Montreal Divide Honors; Toronto Loses Two Games

MONTREAL, April 28 (AP)—Jack Tising pitched four-hit ball in the nightcap to give Syracuse Chiefs a 3-1 victory and an even break in an International Baseball League doubleheader today, after Montreal took the first game 9-4. The games were at Syracuse.

Ace Parker, Syracuse shortstop, collected seven hits in as many times at bat. He drove in three runs and scored twice.

Bob Porter went the route to win the opener as the Royals tied off against the Kleinhans and drove him to cover in the fifth. They got 13 hits off Kleinhans and Hinchkie.

The Chiefs got to Ira Hutchinson for the winning runs in the third frame of the second game and Reg Grabowski pitched scoreless ball thereafter.

At Baltimore, Toronto Maple Leafs suffered a double setback at the hands of the Orioles. The flock, although outwit, won the first 8-3 and captured the second 7-1.

The veteran Orlin Collier held the Leafs to four hits in the seven-inning nightcap, while Ernie Caldwell was belted for 13, including a four-run homer by Bill Naylor.

Dick Miskiff allowed 10 hits in the opener. The birds clustered their eight hits, with Nick Etten exploding a three-run homer in the third stanza.

Eddie Collins had five hits during the day, scored four times and stole three bases.

At Jersey City, the Giants won both ends of a doubleheader from Buffalo Bisons today, taking a 12-inning opener 2-1 and grabbing the seven-inning nightcap 6-3.

Clayton Kershner pitched by Rene Montague to end a five-inning stretch and Glen Stewart's single in the 12th inning featured the Bears 2-1 in another tight game.

WINNIPEG, April 28 (CP)—Vancouver Maple Leafs displayed some high class team work and accurate shooting in the last 10 minutes to come from behind and defeat Winnipeg St. Andrews 37-30 here Saturday in the first game of a best-of-five series for the Western Canada senior men's basketball title.

Leafs used only six men in the contest but it is expected that they will have nine available for the second game tomorrow. The third game will be played Tuesday and with the fourth and fifth day, on Friday and Saturday. The winners will go east to meet Montreal Y.M.H.A. in the Dominion final series starting May 8.

The Bears stole Rochester's winning recipe in the abbreviated second game. A home run by Buster Mill with one aboard, broke a deadlock and clinched a three-run uprising of Elwood (Preacher) Roe that clinched the verdict.

Canadiens Bolster Club

MONTREAL, April 28 (CP)—In a further move to bolster their organization, Montreal's National Hockey League Canadiens have brought hockey-wise Frank Patrick into the fold as business manager and representative for the team on the League's Board of Governors.

Patrick's appointment was announced officially Saturday by the Canadian Arena Company, making the third move in recent weeks by Canadiens' heads in the revitalizing of a team that finished in last place in the 1939-40 season, and in next to last place in the season previous.

Funeral Of Joe Jacobs Held Yesterday

NEW YORK, April 28 (AP)—Funeral services for Joe Jacobs, the fight manager whose big cigar, quick wit and flashy dress made him one of New York's legendary figures, were held today in a Midtown Memorial Chapel packed to overflowing by "the Broadway mob."

Fight managers, sports writers, City and State political figures, fighters, actors and gamblers paid what Rabbi Leo Ginsburg said was a more eloquent tribute to the little man than he could say in words.

Numbered among the honorary pallbearers were Tony Galento, another former titleholder, General John J. Egan, chairman of the New York State Boxing Commission and Jimmy Johnston, voluble fight promoter.

Quebec Hockeyists Support C. A. H. A.

MONTREAL, April 28 (CP)—The Quebec Amateur Hockey Association turned down without consideration Saturday a motion that it reject the definition of an amateur as supplied recently by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

The motion, made by Albert W. Reid of Sherbrooke, vice-president, was ruled out of order by the chair and the delegates to the 22nd annual meeting upheld the ruling. Reid called on the meeting to express disapproval of recent action by the C. A. H. A. in declaring that an amateur is one "who has not, or is not engaged in organized professional hockey."

The Sherbrooke vice-president based his motion on the claim that "the C. A. H. A. has not established its competency to enforce its own peculiar definition of an amateur, which tends to destroy the ideals on which amateur hockey is based and threatens to disrupt hockey in the rural districts."

He called on the Quebec branch to take the necessary steps to recognize the claims of those who favor remuneration of hockey players, and asked that a special division for these players be formed.

Art Labaree was succeeded as President by Norman Dawe of Montreal, a vice-president.

FORMER CATCHER DIES

TROY, N. Y., April 28 (AP)—Henry J. Cote, 76, catcher in major and minor baseball leagues for 20 years, died here Saturday. He died today.

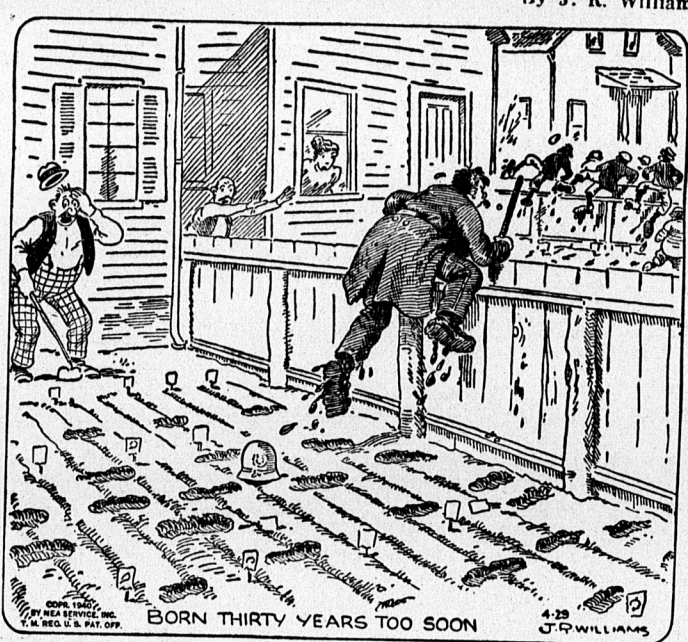
Cote received a gold watch from the Philadelphia Press in 1931 as "most popular individual member of the Philadelphia State League." He was believed to have set a record by catching 155 consecutive games in one season when with Grand Rapids, Mich., of the central league.

Cote also played with Louisville of Old National League, the New York Giants and more than a dozen other teams in the east, southeast and Midwest.

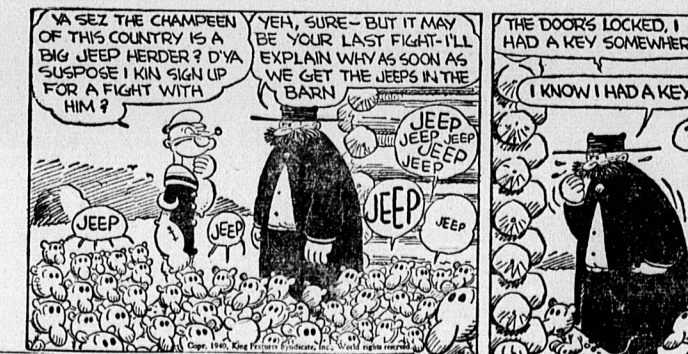
