### Scout News and Notices

Organized, country-wide collection of wastepaper is one of the wartime contributions undertaken by the Boy Scouts of Great Britain.

An acorn gathering bee was a welcomed Thanksgiving hike objective for Brantford Boy Scouts. The acorns were collected at Ebor Park, former Provincial Training Centre for Scout leaders, and were gathered for the Forestry Branch of the Provincial Government.

The physical examination of young men called up for military service in England brought this tribute from a medical examiner associated with Scouting: "The Scouts I examined were absolutely clean from the top of their heads to the soles of their feet, and their physique and bearing made me proud of the Scout Movement."

"Stick to your posts if you possibly can, because service to youth today is service to the nation," was the advice given by Boy Scout and the Forestry Branch of the Board of Education, in a broadcast talk from England on "Education, Part of the Home Front." He stressed the dangers for youth arising from darkened streets, the absence of parental control and the strain of war.

Boy Scouts in cities, towns and villages across Canada are once again sawing, hammering, painting and reassembling discarded playthings in the Christmas Toy Repair Shops, their Dominion-wide good turn for Santa Claus. With this help in past years Old St. Nick has been able to take care of many thousands of children of needy families whom he might otherwise have missed on Christmas eve.

Special attention this year is being given the families of men in military service. As usual the Girl Guides are assisting with the dolls. In many places managers of movie theaters are sharing the good turn by giving a toy shop matinee, the admission to which is a new or repairable old toy.

Each Sunday morning for a number of years Rover Scouts have attended the Star and Garter Home for Disabled Soldiers at Richmond, Surrey, to relieve the regular nurses. Duties include the feeding of men unable to feed themselves, camp gear.
