ST. PAULS CHURCH

At the morning service yesterday, the rector, Reverend A. LeDrew Gardner, took as his text portions of verses three to twelve in the twenty-sixth chapter of the book of Leviticus: "If ye walk in My statutes, and do them, I will give peace in the land, and ye shall lie down, and none shall make you afraid; and I will rid evil beasts out of the land, neither shall the sword go through the land, and ye shall chase your enemies, and they shall fall before you by the sword, and five of you shall chase an hundred and an hundred of you shall put ten thousand to flight; and your enemies shall fall before you by the sword. I will set My tabernacle among you . . . and I will walk among you and will be your God, and ye shall be My people."

That is the astounding promise, the truth of which has been verified. God can do what He pleased the hosts of the Midianites; Jonathan and his armour-bearers defeated the Philistines, etc. But the question of today is, Do we want peace? Do we want an end of suffering and cruelty? Do we want deliverance from fear? If so we can have all these things at any time if we will fulfil the conditions—"walk in My statutes, keep My Commandments, and do them."

Victory we can and will have. We had it 25 years ago and we shall have it again. But we did not a quarter of a century ago have peace. We were not made unafraid, the evil beasts were not driven out of the land—and so our victory was short-lived. Subscribe by all means to the Victory Loan. Subscribe and over-subscribe. Remember that it is the alternate course and cannot bring lasting peace. When individual people see the realization that they cannot succeed in their own strength, setting God as naught; when they realize that and turn to Him, then will we have not only victory—but peace.

CROP PRODUCTION ON DIFFERENT SOIL TYPES

(Experimental Farms News) Subsequent to the soil survey of Carleton County in the Province of Ontario in 1940, a "follow up" program has been instituted by the Field Husbandry Division, Dominion Experimental Farms, with the object of obtaining information in regard to the relative production of various crops on different soil types, as well as some of the methods used in producing maximum crops on each of the soil types. The soils of the County are extremely variable, thus affording an opportunity to study the varying results from pure sand 20 feet or more in depth, through sandy loams overlying clay, deep loams, soils high in organic matter, clay loams and very heavy clays, sates P. O. Ripley, F. d Husbandry Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. While the very deep, light, sandy soils probably in the first place, have been utilized for the production of forests, some such areas are being farmed; the field crops being largely limited to potatoes, rye, and alfalfa. Moisture is a limiting factor, and in a dry year low yields are almost inevitable. Cultural practices are not a problem, because cultivating can be done at almost any time without fear of damaging the soil structure.

At the other extreme, heavy clay soils require entirely different cultural cropping, and fertility management, one of the chief problems being that of drainage, which can be effected by a series of shallow ditches conveniently spaced.

Although these soils are relatively fertile, they will usually respond to application of barnyard manure or to commercial fertilizers containing nitrogen and phosphorus. It is on the intermediate sandy loams, loams and clay loams where the widest range of crops and, generally speaking, the highest yields are obtained. The loam soils are adapted to the growing of corn, grain, hay, roots and potatoes, the latter being favored particularly by sandy loams. Soil fertilization is not so difficult on loam soils as on clay. Although relatively high in fertility, production can usually be increased by applications of manure and commercial fertilizers. This is especially true where cash crops such as potatoes are produced.
