PROMOTED.—Amongst the Canadian Militia promotions gazetted last Saturday was that of Lieut. J. W. Stanley of the P. E. I. Heavy Brigade C. A., who has been raised to the rank of Captain, dating as from 1st February last.

SPRAYING.—The Department of Agriculture has already received some requests for assistance in the application of the codling moth spray. Those who would like to have the services of the men sent out by the Department should apply at once as the men will be sent to those sections where there is the most work to be done. Arsenate of lead and concentrated lime sulphur can be secured at cost from the Department.

THE PRINCE EDWARD.—The programme of pictures shown at the Prince Edward Theatre last night was up to the usual standard of excellence. "A Bride from the Sea," being a particularly good two-reel film. In it there is a highly exciting scene in which the heroine's former lover, a now desperate degenerate, tries by force to steal her from her husband's house at night. MISSIONARY MEETING.—Secretary Caskey of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in Canada, D. M. Ross, the Anglican Church Secretary and R. M. Hamilton the Presbyterian Secretary are to be in Prince Edward Island from June 18th to June 30th, and it is proposed that Conferences be held similar to the series that were held last winter in British Columbia and Ontario, pronounced by Mission Board Secretaries and interested laymen as the best piece of work done by the Laymen's Movement in Canada. It is proposed that they be joined by a Methodist speaker from the Foreign Field, and that meetings be as follows:—Alberton June 18th, Kensington June 22nd, Charlottetown June 25th, Summerside June 26th, Murray River 26th, Montague 29th, Souris 30th. At each of these places there will be a summer and a two hour conference on Methods of missionary work. Enough places have already agreed to the plans so that there will be no doubt about the program being carried out so far as possible, though it may be that in one or two places local difficulties may prevent. The speakers are all men of experience in their line, and the plan is to reach through these seven Conferences practically every congregation on the Island, and it is hoped that every church will plan to send one or more delegates to the nearest Conference night. The topic of the addresses will be largely the methods of missionary work followed in other parts of Canada. These meetings should prove an incentive to church workers of all denominations.
