### PRODUCE

 MONTREAL, Nov. 4—Cheese prices went up last week, followed by the Montreal market today following higher levels established on country boards during the week-end. No. 1 Ontario sold at 10 1/2 to 11 1/4 cents per pound and No. 1 Quebec at 10 to 10 1/4 cents.  
 Butter prices advanced at 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 cents per pound for No. 1 in cartons or less. Small lots to 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents per pound for solids and 20 1/2 to 21 cents for prints.  
 Eggs were firm with graded shipments of 45 to 48 cents for A large, 41 to 43 cents for B medium, 35 to 37 cents for C small, 28 to 30 cents for D, and 23 1/2 to 24 cents for E.  
 Prices strengthened in the potato division. Prince Edward Island mountains were 93 to 95 cents and cobs were 88 to 90 cents, per 90 pound bag, in 80 pound bags. Prince Edward Island mountains and New Brunswick mountains were 82 to 85 cents. Prince Edward Island cobs were 78 to 80 cents, Quebec mountains 75 to 80 cents and Quebec cobs 69 to 70 cents.

## LIVESTOCK

(Canadian Press)  
 MONTREAL, Nov. 5—Offerings on the two Montreal livestock markets today totalled 1,228 head. Receipts were composed of 93 cattle, 117 calves, 306 hogs and 112 sheep and lambs.  
 Cattle were steady. The steers offered were of mixed quality ranging from medium to medium good and were quoted at \$1.25 to \$3. Good cows brought \$1.50 to \$3.50 with medium kinds from \$2.75 to \$3. Common butcher cows \$2 to \$2.50. Calves and cutters were from \$1.50 to \$2 and common bulls \$2.25 to \$2.75.  
 Grass calves sold from \$3 to \$3.75 with the bulk at \$4 to \$5.25 with odd tops at \$3.50 to \$3. Calves weighing over 300 pounds were hard to sell at prices ranging from \$3.75 to \$5. A part-load of heavy western calves was bought to be shipped to the country at \$1.25.  
 Good swine and weaners were steady at \$7. Heavy lumps brought \$5 with culls and bucks at \$5. Sheep ranged from \$2 to \$3. Bacon hogs brought \$5.16 to \$5.25 fed and watered, with 1 1/2 per hog premium on 100 lbs. extra heavy and lights were cut \$1 per cwt. Sows were from \$9 to \$10.20.

## Scout News and Notices

Admiral Viscount Makoto Saito, former Premier, and for some years a member of the Japanese Boy Scouts Association, is the new Chief Scout for Japan.  
 The new 8th Fredericton, N. B. Scout Group are the fortunate possessors of a club room headquarters comprising a library and reading room, a workshop, a photographic room, a Court of Honour room, and an assembly hall. The Group is fostered by the Brotherhood of Wilmet Church.

Interesting features of a "Be Kind to Animals" week in Tokyo, Japan, included collection of money on a street corner by a famous dog. Tania, a kindness to horses meeting, a Day for Draught Animals, when over a thousand Boy Scouts treated the animals to carrots and water, and a parade of children and their pets.

Speaking of the world tour of Lord Baden-Powell and herself which recently concluded with their visit to Canada, Lady Baden-Powell mentioned their stay in Java. Of course the native diet is frugal—a handful of rice and a couple of bananas is sufficient each day. But we could learn a lot from the attitude of these Eastern people. Their kindness, their friendly spirit and their goodness shine from their eyes.

Two rescues from drowning within a half hour was the feat of a 15 year old Scout, Patrol Leader Jack Holmes of Blackpool, England. For the first rescue Holmes leaped from a breakwater and swam some distance through a rough sea to bring in an unconscious woman. The second rescue was a companion there came a cry for help from an exhausted man, and the Scout, with his chum, again plunged in, and brought the man ashore. The unusual rescue feat was recognized by the award of the Scout Silver Cross.

Fifty Polish Sea Scouts aboard their training schooner the "Zawisza Czarny" this summer visited brother Sea Scouts at ports in Denmark, Holland, Belgium, London, Sweden, Finland, Estonia and Latvia.

Eighteen Papuan (New Guinea) native medical students before leaving for home after completing their course at Sydney University, formed themselves into the world's first Scout Medical Troop. As "certified" medical assistants they will carry on their work in Scout uniform throughout the wild territory of New Guinea.

After a brief rest following their Canadian tour, Lord and Lady Baden-Powell are now en route to Africa, to attend the big South African Scout Jamboree at East London in January. On the way down the east coast they will meet Scout and Guide at Mombasa, Zanzibar, Beira and other places, and will return by the west coast, stopping at numerous ports where Scouting has been established.

Although the Boy Scout code would not permit bull fighting, a successful battle, Toreador fashion, with a pitch-fork as a weapon, won silver for Scout Leslie Wilkinson, 15, of Northcote, England. The animal had twice tossed a farmer when the boy arrived. He attacked the beast with the fork, jabbing it until it turned and pursued him. He leaped a fence to safety, the farmer meanwhile crawling out of danger. Completing his good turn the Scout rendered first aid to the injured man.
