N. Y. And Toronto Stock Prices Continue Upward

NEW YORK, March 7 — (AP) — A final spurt of buying pushed the stock market higher today in a session marked by considerable indecision.

The first and the last hours saw the best volume and prices. Railroad issues were in command on the top side throughout among the major groups. But growing strength was shown by oils, steels, aircraft and a number of miscellaneous industrials.

United Corp. up 1-8 at 3 was the most active issue. Merritt-Chapman & Scott with the sale of one block of 13,500 shares became second most active, up 5-8 at 22 1-4.

The total volume of trading was 84,000 shares as against 730,000 on Friday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 2 of a point to 63.4, a position equal to Feb. 5, Industrials and rails each gained 7/4 of a point, and utilities lost 2 of a point.

At Toronto TORONTO, March 7 — (CP) — Stocks made the best showing in an otherwise dull session on the Toronto Stock Exchange today. Base metals slowly tightened on narrow advances and western oils were quietly firmer.

Some early fractional gains in the senior golds were wiped out in the last hour and junior producers extended the dull session. Gains ranged up to about 15 cents in Campbell, Chesterville, Cochenour, Giant Yellowknife, East Malartic and San Antonio.

Gains more than tripled losses in base metals. Consolidated Smelters rose quietly for a gain of 1-2 at 103 1-2 and Hudson Bay International Nickel and Noranda the other members of the big four group, added fractions. Waite Amulet and Silanco slipped lower.

Calgary and Edmonton was ahead 10 cents at \$5 in a two-way western oil list while Royalty dipped five cents and Decalta, six cents in active dealings.

The exchange's closing index showed golds up 1.02 at 93.83, base metals 53 at 96.97, western oils 11 at 59.09. Golds listed 57 gains, 48 losses, 40 unchanged; base metals, 16 gains, 5 losses, 5 unchanged; western oils, 8 gains, 7 losses, 6 unchanged.

At Montreal MONTREAL, March 7 — (CP) — Securities worked on a slow downward in dull dealings on the Montreal stock exchange and curb market today.

Mining stocks generally were unchanged to a shade easier in fairly active sales. Utilities, steels, metals and oils were dull and edged into higher ground, but papers were steady.

Industrial turnover was slightly higher than new 1949 low in transactions set Feb. 22, but showed a drop of 2,100 shares from Friday's 22,700 shares. Mining sales were 128,700 shares against 159,400 shares Friday.

Of 150 issues traded, 49 were higher, 53 were lower and 48 remained unchanged. Four new highs and 13 new lows were established. Closing averages indicated banks ahead .03 and utilities ahead 2, but papers dipped .18, industrial 1 and golds .01.

Experience Important

"By understanding the new needs and the new interests of the world in which they live, they can offer something of literary value. If you are to be an honest writer, you must draw on something you have experienced yourself."

Mrs. Salverson, daughter of Icelanders who came to Canada in the mass migration of the 1880's after a volcanic eruption ruined their land and homes, sees an improvement in the trend of modern writing, especially in Britain.

"The adolescent hard-boiled writing in on the wane. People are fed up with it. Our generation has gone through two world wars and has got enough horror in factual reading."

Mrs. Salverson's first love is writing. She hates housework. And if she wasn't literarily inclined, "I'd like to paint or take up the theatre."

She was the first spokesman of a Canadian minority. But despite honors awarded her writing, the autobiography "Confessions of an Immigrant's Daughter" is hardly known in Canada. It was first published in England where it was hailed as a literary event, but the outbreak of war halted complete distribution. It is now being published in Canada.

In 1937 her novel "The Dark Weaver" won the Governor-General's award and two years later "Confessions" won the award for prose non-fiction. The latter book, a brave and authentic work of the struggles of the author and her family to make their own place in a land then cold towards new settlers, is recommended by the United Nations for information of people in other countries.
