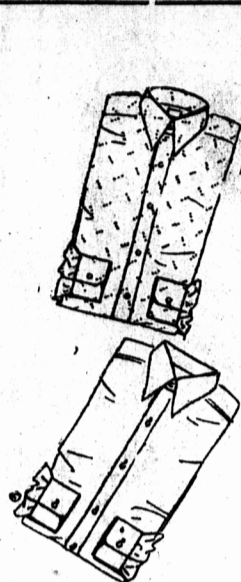

(Special to The Guardian) WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—A bill to amend the tariff act to prohibit exportation of flour milled from imported Canadian wheat and shipped as a United States product was introduced today by Rep. Garner, representing Oklahoma. He said Canadian wheat thus milled is now exported to Cuba under the favorable trade treaty granting products of American agriculture a 30 per cent reduction. South Atlantic seaboard interests, he said, cannot compete with millers along the North Atlantic seaboard, where shipping facilities are more convenient unless this amendment is passed.
