THE COMING LIB-CON. CONFERENCE. OF PERSONAL MENTION.

Sir,—In a few days the Liberal Conservative Conference of P. E. Island will meet in convention in Charlottetown. In view of the great amount of press correspondence about organization it is presumed that some much needed steps in this direction will be taken. It is to be hoped that something more practical will be done than the mere passing of resolutions condemning the present procedure of the Government and affirming our confidence in the Hon. R. L. Brien. The party supporters expect something more from the coming meeting. It might also be well to dispense with any long winded orations concerning the achievements of the past. No doubt this affair is an excellent subject for the speaker whose limited mental capacity does not permit him to originate and present in feasible form measures of more practical benefit to his party nor is it desirable that the conference—now that after a period of two years it has finally gotten itself together—should develop into a mutual admiration society and use up the greater part of its time passing resolutions laudatory of men whose tenure of office has been distinguished for anything but success. Subjects of much more importance might well engage the attention of those who will take part in its deliberations, and it is earnestly to be hoped that for once business methods will prevail. Perhaps one of the most important matters which could be brought before the convention is the necessity of the control by the party of an energetic newspaper. I believe without the aid of this most important auxiliary the path to power will be most difficult to travel. No one can gainsay the statement that it is absolutely necessary for us to possess a paper strong in its adherence to Conservatism, decided in its editorials, clear in its denunciation of what is wrong in the policy of its opponents, opposing in no half-hearted way those measures which it believes to be for the detriment of this Province, bright and breezy in its news, in a word a paper whose own intrinsic worth will commend it to a large and increasing circle of readers among whom its work will be plainly evident on polling day. While the party workers and party orators may rest from their labors the party newspaper goes steadily on. This silent missionary, this tireless worker, never ceases from its campaign, day after day, year after year, it works sowing the seeds the harvest of which we will one day gather, and it should be owned and exclusively controlled by the party supporters and have their moral and financial support. It is not solely dependent upon the precarious income to be derived from a few advertisers and whose opposition to certain men and measures is in proportion to the amount of their advertising in its columns. The party paper should never be under the sole control of any one individual or citizen. Where this state prevails it is not the organ of the party but the exponent of the favored few who are directly interested in it. I am not finding fault with the papers at present purporting to represent the views of the party here. Under existing conditions they are doing all perhaps that can be expected of them and the weakness of the party press at present, while a matter of regret to most of us is largely attributable to the party itself. So long as the bulk of the stock of the party paper is held by a very limited few and those who are most prominently before the public as the party leaders possess no interest in it, so long will the paper be instead of an aid, a millstone around the party neck. The work of the convention will be far from complete if it fail to take up this most important question and carry it through. Our Liberal opponents I must say, are in advance of us in this matter and if we intend to cope with them we must first improve our press. Yours etc. P. E. Island Jan. 28th.
