Comedy And Musical Attraction At Prince Edward

It isn't often movie-makers are fortunate enough to co-ordinate catchy musical numbers in such a pleasing way with a well-sustained but nonsensical plot, as in "Diplomaniacs" which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre.

The new RKO-Radio Picture has the irresistible appeal of broad burlesque, opening on an Indian Reservation where those side-splitting comedians, Bert Wheeler and Robert Woolsey, are commissioned to represent the Indians at the Peace Conference in Geneva.

The redskins believe Willy Nilly and Horatio Glub are dumb enough to make good diplomats. Their adventures in Switzerland, where a group of ammunition makers attempt to talk their efforts to get a peace pact signed, and their romance with a pair of hired Parisian vamps whose kisses make men swoon and smoke about the collar, make lively action and riotous comedy.

The sequences which take place in what purports to be the Peace Conference hall are sublimely ridiculous. Machine guns, missiles and bombs take the place of veiled innuendos and ironic notes. The whole affair turns into a riot of fun and music when Wheeler and Woolsey enlist the entire delegation in an impromptu black-face minstrel act.

Marjorie White and Phyllis Barry give the art of making lozenges out of men a new vogue, with just the proper amount of nonsense. Their slinking, lured mode of locomotion and their honeyed wooing adds zest to the work of the comedians.

The musical numbers in this elaborately-staged production establish a new precedent for variety, each song and ensemble number opening with some striking situation. One number is sung by Wheeler while Miss White sits on his chest after besting him in a wrestling match.

Twenty-four Hollywood beauties, selected and trained by Larry Ceballos, celebrated dance impresario, appear in five delightful ensembles. One of these is a great pot-pourri of comedy and beauty and rhythm. In it the comedians are awakened, dragged from bed and dressed by a bevy of beautiful dancing girls.

The accompanying shorts round out a splendid program with Sport Thrills, Musical Revue and a Silly Symphony "Three Little Pigs."

Withdrawal Of Troops Demanded

STRATFORD, Ont., Sept. 27 (C.P.)—A large crowd of Stratford workers tonight passed a resolution demanding immediate withdrawal of troops brought here in connection with a tense strike situation and resignation of Mayor George I. Graff.

"Emergency Call" At Capitol A Revelation

A swift-paced picture, red-blooded drama of the heroism of the hospital ambulance service, "Emergency Call" provoked enthusiastic plaudits from the Capitol Theatre first-nighters for the splendid acting by Bill Boyd, Wynne Gibson and William Gargan, the adroit direction, and the fast and actionful story.

Moving with the speed of an express train and teeming with thrills and suspense, "Emergency Call" is a strikingly human document of the colorful careers of a young ambulance doctor and his driver, Bill Boyd, as Joe Bradley, is the idealistic and courageous interne, William Gargan, as Steve Brennan, is a wise-cracking devil-may-care driver. Their dangerous and exciting adventures in opposing a gang of ambulance chasing racketeers provide the action.

Trapped in an abandoned warehouse, where they have been lured by a fake emergency call, Bradley and Brennan engage in a savage hand-to-hand fight with murderous ruffians. Police come to their aid, but not before Brennan has been stabbed in the encounter and an operation is necessary to save his life. Bradley performs the delicate surgery.

The action races to a sensational climax when Bradley, thirsting to avenge his buddy, tracks down and corners the racketeering chief. The climax of this pulse-stirring drama picture is the death of the gangster at the hands of Brennan's sweet-heart-nurse, superbly portrayed by Wynne Gibson.

Boyd, who may always be counted upon for a superlative characterization as a rugged hero, garners additional laurels by his role in "Emergency Call". Gargan makes a bid for stardom with his remarkable performance as the recklessly gallant ambulance driver. Miss Gibson displays unusual versatility, that up-and-coming starlet, Betty Furness, is good in a brief but important part.

On the short subject program, an Andy Clyde comedy, "Feeling Rosy" and a Naturegraph Novelty "Cougars Mistake".

IMPORTATION OF TEXTILES CONSIDERED

OTTAWA, Sept. 28—Equality of opportunity for British textile industries to compete in the Canadian market with the Canadian industries did not mean that this market should be divided 50-50 between them, R. P. Sparks, spokesman for the Canadian Association of Garment Manufacturers, argued before the Tariff Board today. Such a condition was not contemplated by the framers of the Ottawa agreements last year. If it were so, then the Canadian industry would have to turn over \$100,000,000 a year—or half of its business—to the British manufacturers, a situation that could not be thought of.

Mr. Sparks occupied practically the whole of the afternoon session of the Tariff Board which today opened its first public hearing on the application of the British Government for a revision of the Canadian Tariff on Textile. He had been preceded by H. E. Mackleton of Bradford, England, representing the Wood Textile Delegation, and Henry Barrett of Toronto, for the Canadian Association of Woollen and Knit Goods Manufacturers.

OTTAWA, Sept. 28—With many distinguished citizens following the cortège, the Liberal funeral service for Hon. Pascal Poirier, 81-year-old Acadian Senator who died yesterday, was chanted at the Sacred Heart Church today. The body of the last surviving appointee of Sir John A. MacDonald to the Upper House was then placed on an afternoon train for Shediac, N. B., where the regular funeral service and interment will take place.

In the funeral procession were Premier R. B. Bennett, Sir Robert Borden, War-time Prime Minister; Hon. Arsene Henry, Minister for France to Canada, members of the Dominion Cabinet and leaders in many walks of life.

Besides his widow, formerly Miss Mathilde Casgrain, Quebec, chief mourners were Senator J. P. B. Casgrain and Abbe Casgrain, brothers-in-law, Montreal.

Personal messages of sympathy sent to Madame Poirier included ones from Mr. Bennett, Hon. Murray MacLaren, Minister of Pensions and National Health and Hon. Arthur Sauve, Postmaster General.

Canadian Singer In Famous Opera

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (C.P.)—Ivy Dale, youthful Canadian opera singer, is to appear at the Gala Opera Festival in Washington Auditorium October 1, and will sing the mezzo soprano lead in Cavalleria Rusticana.

Miss Dale returns to the operatic stage in the United States after a year's banishment from this country, during which period she has made a name for herself in her adopted Canada. The brilliant mezzo soprano was born in England and went to Canada with her parents at an early age. They settled in Guelph, Ont.

Airship Service Near Realization

AKRON, Sept. 28—Transatlantic Zeppelin service between Europe and the United States was seen as nearing realization today by Dr. Hugo Eckener, famed Graf Zeppelin skipper.

"With President Paul W. Litchfield of the Goodyear-Zeppelin Corporation I have worked out a program for carrying that dream to realization," Dr. Eckener announced Saturday as he concluded a day and a half of almost continuous conferences.

Dr. Eckener disclosed he hopes to start the service in the Spring of 1935. By that time the LZ-129, now under construction at Friedrichshafen, will be completed and ready for operation.

An effort will be made to get permission of the United States navy to use the hangar at Lakehurst, N. J., as a terminal, Dr. Eckener said. If this cannot be done a mooring mast will be stationed at some suitable landing place between Philadelphia and Washington.

Dr. Eckener also said he had under consideration, and believed feasible, a special schedule of winter sailings to and from Miami, Fla., which would provide tourists with service to Spain and across the Mediterranean.
