ABYSSINIANS HAVE WAR OF THEIR OWN.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The struggle in Abyssinia, between government forces and troops of the deposed Emperor Lidi Jeassu, who recently escaped to the mountains after having been surrounded by government troops at Magdala for six months, has resulted in the rout of Lidi Jeassu's army after a fierce battle, according to a Reuter's despatch from Addis Ababa under date of August 29. The former Emperor's best generals were killed while in action and it is believed that he himself was shot while attempting to escape, but this has not yet been confirmed. The engagement took place in the neighborhood of Dessie.

MEMBERS OF HOME UNITS TO TRANSFER OVERSEAS

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—An order has been issued at Ottawa ordering the demobilization of all units of the Canadian defence force. The instructions received at the local military headquarters stated that all members of the Canadian defence units were to be allowed to transfer into the Canadian expeditionary force for service overseas, providing they could pass the necessary medical examinations. Those who failed to take this opportunity of transferring would be liable under the conscription act and the same standing as any civilian.

THE SITUATION STILL CLOUDY.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

PETROGRAD, Sept. 10.—Members of the Russian Cabinet today told the Associated Press that the Provisional Government regarded General Korniloff's pronouncement as an act of rebellion which must be ruthlessly suppressed. The government, it was added, believed it had enough loyal troops, and the support of the Russian people, to enable it to put down the Korniloff movement.

An official statement says that General Lokomsky, also proved a traitor, refusing to take command of the Russian armies in succession to General Korniloff. The Soldier's and Workmen's bodies, the statement adds, have ordered all the army organization to obey the Provisional Government against the conspiracy, stating that General Korniloff will be punished for treachery, and that General, Klembovsky will provisionally succeed to the chief command.

MISS GERTRUDE CURRAN

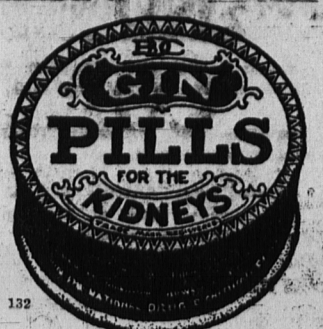

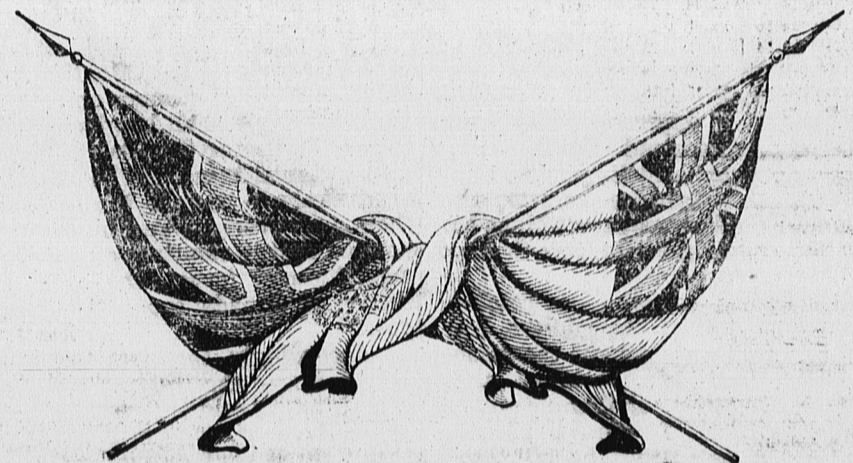
