**A GOOD MEETING.**  
On Friday afternoon a meeting was held in Murray River to consider the advisability of holding a seed fair sometime during the winter. Representatives were present from all the surrounding districts and an enthusiastic meeting was the result. It was agreed that the fair should be held at Murray River between the time of the Souris and Georgetown Fairs. It was further agreed that the fair should be open to Lots, 58, 60, 62, 63 & 64. The classes for which prizes are to be offered are as follows:—Wheat, White Russian, Wheat, any other variety, White Oats, Old Island Black Oats, Barley, Buckwheat, Timothy, Potatoes, McIntyre and Dakota Red, White Star, and any other variety. Eschallots or onions, and collection Island weed seeds. It was further agreed that the rules and regulations governing seed fairs throughout the Province should be adopted by the Southern Seed Fair, to be held in Murray River. It was further agreed that the prize list should not exceed \$90.00. ### MILLION FORTUNE COMES TO DRIVER OF TEAM.

MONTGOMERY, Mo., Jan. 7.—David Eugart, formerly a deliveryman in Macon, Mo., now of Fort Scott, Kan., will receive a great present in the near future, according to John Dale, his brother-in-law. Eugart has received notice that he is heir to an estate of more than a million dollars, left him by his great-grand-father.

A ninety-nine year lease on very valuable property in the heart of New York has expired and the property reverts back to the Eugart heirs and is to be settled.

Eugart is the second citizen of Macon to receive notice he had inherited a great fortune. The other one was Colonel F. W. Bles, who received more than a million dollars when he was in poor circumstances. He spent most of it in improving his town and building the great Bles Military Academy at Macon, which has just passed from his estate by a ruling of the federal court at Hannibal. Bles met a tragic death in St. Louis six years ago.

The Eugarts say they will not emulate his example when they get their vast fortune. Eugart formerly drove a delivery wagon in Macon, and was later superintendent of the Poor Farms. Mrs. Eugart is now visiting in Kansas City.

### ENORMOUS INCREASES IN BRITAIN'S TRADE

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Record increases in the trade of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland are shown by the Board of Trade figures for the year ending Dec. 31 with total imports of £244,896,544 (approximately \$3,724,482,770), and total exports of £247,434,962 (\$2,437,170,010), the aggregate increase reaches the enormous sum of £28,153,691 (\$491,288,455), the respective increases were in imports £64,738,987 (\$323,694,935), and exports £33,314,704 (\$166,575,520). Grain and flour account for upwards of \$60,000,000 of this increase in imports and other food for nearly \$2,000,000; tobacco is responsible for \$5,000,000 increase, cotton from America for \$32,500,000. The principal increases in exports were in iron and steel, \$50,000,000, coal \$20,000,000, and in textiles \$10,000,000. The imports of bullion during the year totalled £71,422,077 (approximately \$357,110,385), against exports of £64,724,213 (\$323,621,065).

### PREFERRICTON MAY VOTE ON POLICE QUESTION

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 7.—A plebiscite will probably be held in Fredericton within the next couple of months to allow the citizens to decide for themselves whether or not the police commission will be an independent body, and if so if the commissioners are to be elected or appointed.

### BULGARIAN AVIATOR DASHED INTO TURKISH CAVALRY.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—A cable from Paris to the Tribune says: "The death of the air scout, Lieut. Topraktchieff, of the Bulgarian army at Adrianople, which was the first occurrence of its kind in warfare, will occupy a place in history. Eye witnesses say that he was ordered to fly over the besieged city and ascertain whether the Turks were preparing for a sortie. A division of Turkish infantry, supported by artillery and cavalry, was in readiness to march. The waiting Turks volcanoes led as him and the Bulgarians watching the machine with their glasses, saw a jet of flames and a cloud of smoke enveloping the aviator. Turning around he volplaned like lightning into the middle of the Turkish cavalry, killing several.

Knowing that he was doomed, he had resolved to sell his life as dearly as possible. His body was recovered with a smoking revolver in his right hand. He had blown out his brains a second before the crash came.

### MR. BORDEN'S STATEMENT

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Borden's statement that members of the British Cabinet and Opposition leaders had explicitly accepted the principle that the overseas dominions were entitled to a share in the responsibilities of the direction of their Imperial Policy was brought up in the House of Commons last night. Dr. Pirrie, Liberal member for North Aberdeen, asked Premier Asquith if in view of the changes involved in the Home Rule Bill he could call a conference of the representative Dominions. The Premier said he feared it would be impossible. The Commons last night by 311 to 81 sanctioned the amendment Home Rule Bill "moved by Sir Alfred Mond, Liberal, and seconded by Mr. Redmond. It provides against constituency which returns 3 or more members to the Irish Parliament returning all Nationalists or all Orangemen.

### ROUGH TRIP

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—The British Cruiser Natal which brought the body of Whitelaw Reid here will remain two weeks to repair the damage sustained on the voyage from Portsmouth, when her plates were smashed by the seas. It just came out that the officers say the cruiser was nearly lost on the night of December 23rd, in a gale of 30 miles per hour. Two guns broke loose and gave the cruiser a list of 40 degrees, a cutter was blown from the davits and the fore and main topmasts were broken off.
