INTERESTING OLD MAP.—Mr. Matthew Murphy, caretaker of the Charlottetown Fire Station showed a representative of the Guardian yesterday a very interesting relic of old times in the shape of one of the old maps of P. E. Island prepared by Captain Holland, Surveyor. This map shows the island divided up into lots and gives a list of the lots and the original proprietors. It also tells the number of acres in the towns. For instance it says that in "Charlotte Town Common and pasture lots there are 7,300 acres; George Town 4,000 acres; Prince Town 4,000 acres." Other valuable information is tabulated on this map such as the acreage of the County, which is given as follows: Queen's County, 486,400; Kings, 412,000; Prince, 467,000, giving the total acreage of the Island as 1,365,400.

A TRIBUTE.—The Halifax Herald publishes the following with an excellent photo of the gallant Captain "Dan" McKinnon, formerly one of the best known followers of the harness racing game in the Maritime Provinces, is now commanding officer of the 36th battery, stationed in Fredericton last winter. Letters, received here from members of the 36th battery state that Capt. McKinnon was given command of the battery after Major Walter Crowe was relieved to take a higher position in the Imperial service.

The new commanding officer of the 36th battery was formerly in command of No. 11 Field Howitzer Ammunition column, having raised this unit with headquarters at Halifax during February of this year.
