Kinsmen Against Cancer Aid Fund

MONTREAL, Aug. 26 — Delegates to the Association of Kinsmen Clubs convention here yesterday turned down a resolution which suggested the clubs contribute \$150,000 toward a national fund to reduce deaths from cancer in the Dominion.

Delegates defeated the resolution which included Charles Poole, North Toronto, and J.W. McAsk-ill, of Saskatoon. They maintained that Kinsmen clubs' main object was local projects.

"People are fed up with sending money away from the communities where our real duty lies as a service club," contended J.W. Sutcliffe of Kenora.

Hal Poole, president of Montreal Kinsmen, cited the educational value of the project and Hal Rogers of Toronto, founder of the Kinsmen movement, pointed out that while 80 per cent of the clubs' effort should be concentrated in their various communities, "national unity demanded a national project." Edward O'Shea of Montreal, urged trial of the plan for one year on the grounds that Kinsmen Clubs needed a "wider outlook."

The convention earlier turned down a resolution suggesting that, as a national project, funds be raised to aid the National Committee for Mental Hygiene. This was objectionable, said Hugh Wilson, of Perth, one of the projects dealt with matters requiring the co-operation of the province and it was unknown whether this co-operation would be offered.

A cheque for \$6388 from the Kinsmen Service Fund was presented to the National Office of the Boys' Club of Canada. It was received by Vernon F. McAdam, B.B.C. general secretary, who thanked the Kinsmen Clubs Association for its interest and support.

"No Decision" At Meeting Of Hospital Board

No report as to why work on construction of the new Prince County Hospital had been stopped or when it would be recommenced was given out following a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital last evening. Mr. M. L. Bradshaw, Vice-Chairman of the Board who presided at the meeting, said there had been "no decision". The men on the job were paid off at 12.30 noon on Saturday and were not told when they would be needed again.

Foundation Maritime Ltd. of Halifax have the general contract and the sub-contract for excavation is held by the County Construction Co. Ltd. of Charlottetown and their work was just about completed when the work was stopped.

Baptist Federation Of Canada Meets

WOLFVILLE, N.S., Aug. 26 — "A practical step in the federation ought to take at once is to make overtures to the Disciples of Christ for greater co-operation, or for definite union of the two denominations in Canada," said Dr. G.C. Gibson in the presidential address yesterday to the Baptist Federation of Canada. He also told that the federation has taken under advisement further co-operation with the other evangelical denominations of Canada.

Present Reports
The challenge of Christian education was presented by leaders in this type of work across Canada. Rev. J.A. Gregory, Toronto, director of Christian education for Ontario and Quebec, presented the challenge, stating that Christian education is the most effective means of conservation of a of evangelism and telling of the work of the Canadian Baptist Committee of Christian Education. Rev. T.B. MacDorland, Toronto, editor of Baptist Publications, presented the work of that committee. He showed how much the business had grown during the 19 years of its existence. Dr. A. Gibson, Wolfville, told of the work of the Maritime Christian Education Board, particularly in Sunday School and Young Peoples work. Rev. Nelson Chappell, Toronto, secretary of the Christian Education Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches, told of the work of that committee and made a strong challenge for boys' work in churches and camps. Mrs. E.G. Blackadar, Ottawa, gave a report on deaconess training. She told of the courses offered at McMaster and Acadia universities to train women for Christian work in the churches. At the close of the report it was moved and carried that the Canadian Baptist Committee on Christian Education become a committee of the federation.

Home Missions
The evening session of the federation was highlighted by a panel discussion on Canadian missions that accentuated the many different types of work that is done by the Baptist Church in Canada. Under the chairmanship of Rev. E.E. Whiting, Wolfville, superintendent of Maritime Home Missions, speakers emphasized Christian work among French, Polish and other language groups, with Negro churches, and work in scattered rural areas in all parts of the Dominion of Canada.

Greetings to the federation from the Northern Baptist Convention, United States, were extended by Rev. C. Harry Atkinson, New York, secretary of the department of edifice funds and building counsel of the American Baptist Home Mission Society.
Other reports were presented during the afternoon. The report for ordination and credentials was presented by Rev. Elbert Paul, Vancouver, and Dr. F.L. Orchard, Toronto, and a resolution passed
