ARE BRITISH PUBLIC MEN MORE HIGHMINDED THAN OURS?

John Ross Robertson, proprietor of the Toronto Telegram, is watching the British elections on the spot and furnishing some interesting observations thereon for Toronto readers. He notes the scholarly and refined courtesy in which Mr Balfour suggests that the truth has been inadvertently omitted from the remarks of Mr. Asquith, and the delightfully courteous intimation by the Premier that Mr. Balfour in the haste of making up his speech has overlooked that portion of the decalogue which prohibits the bearing of false witness. But Mr Robertson, as an impartial Canadian, after hearing both the Liberal and the Unionist leaders is driven to believe that each of them has some reason to doubt the veracity of the other, and that neither Mr. Balfour nor Mr. Asquith is more remarkable for particular exactitude of statement than the average party leader in Canada.

Mr Robertson goes on: "Distance lends enchantment to the view of politics in the United Kingdom. Canadians are no better than they ought to be in the veracity of their leaders and newspapers. Canadian politics assays just as high in veracity as old country politics, nor do the leaders and newspapers of Canada stray much further from the truth than the leaders and newspapers of the old land." It is also a great mistake to imagine that no electors in England are hide-bound to party.

Mr Robertson attended a Balfour meeting at Haxley that was made up of red-hot partisans and ready to cheer for anything, and an Asquith meeting at Bath which was no better in that regard. Each party has a large following who glory in never having voted for the other side. But the saving salt is found in the large body of independent voters, of which England has thousands where Canada has dozens. It is these that make elections doubtful and prevent any party having a too long lease of power.

Mr Robertson found Premier Asquith putting up a pretty stiff bluff to his hearers as, at one of his meetings he enlarged upon the high price of bread and the great cost of living in Canada and the United States. He was speaking in Bath at the time and there was a Canadian baker present who had made and sold bread in Winnipeg. So a comparison was brought on, which showed that in Winnipeg a customer gets 30 pounds of bread for a dollar while in Bath they get 32 pounds for the same money. But the Winnipeg baker and the driver who distributes the loaves to customers are paid twice the amount of wages paid for the same work in Bath. Granulated sugar sells for 4 cents per pound in Bath, the best tea at 44 cents and the cheapest at 30 cents, while bacon ranges from 18 to 24 cents per pound. After all, food is not so marvellously cheap in free trade England.

THE LATEST NEWS FROM THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.

The news from the British elections is a longdrawn out story, in strange contrast with the reports of a general election in Canada. For many elections past in this country The Guardian has been able to give its readers almost the full returns on the morning following the one day of polling. The elections in the United Kingdom, on the contrary, extend over two weeks, and the returns for each day are not immediately available.

For the general reader who cares little for minor details, it may be observed that the Government party is made up of three divisions, Liber-

als, Irish Nationalists and Laborites. The Opposition forces are classed under the one name of Unionists. The following figures give the latest information we have as to the standing of parties in the elections heard from:

IS THERE A COMET NOW VISIBLE IN THE SKY?

Some young skaters on the ice in the harbor on Thursday evening shortly after sunset, reported having seen a comet of considerable brilliancy in the sky near that part of the horizon behind which the sun had gone down. Others who went out on the ice a little later to get a clear view of the interesting object, unobstructed by buildings, were unable to see it. A possible explanation was that the comet, like the sun had gone down out of sight.

The report of the skaters was generally discredited by those who could not believe that a comet had thus come suddenly into view of the naked eye while astronomers were closely watching the sky and had reported that Halley's comet was as yet only visible through powerful glasses.

But later came reports from a number of persons about town who reported that they, too, had seen a comet, much as described by the skaters. Yesterday afternoon Bamford Woods of Alexandra, visited staff last evening.

The Guardian office and reported that he and several members of his family had on Thursday evening clearly seen the comet from the front of his dwelling. His son had seen it first and called his attention to the fact.

Mr Wood took an opera glass of good power and reports that he verified the fact that a comet was then clearly visible in the western sky. It appeared as quite a bright star with a luminous train or tail extending upwards in the sky.

When the nights are again clear there will be many observers on the look-out. Is this Halley's famous comet or some other luminous visitor from the far-off realms of space? Let the astronomers tell us. Or were so many observers at different points all the victims of an optical illusion?

Since the above was in type the comet was clearly seen for a short time by a member of The Guardian staff.

DR. MCPHAIL IN ENGLAND.

Dr MacPhail, who has been paying a flying visit to the Old Country, returns to Canada on Saturday. A man of letters and a member of the Faculty of Medicine of McGill, his very able political essays, which were published this year under the title of "Essays in Politics," made his name well known among publicists on both sides of the Atlantic; while we also owe him much for the establishment of the University Magazine, the leading Canadian review which he ably edits. On Monday he was the chief guest of Professor Osier at a dinner given by him at the Athenaeum. Other prominent Anglo-Canadians who were invited to meet Dr Osier's guest, Sir Thomas Barlow, Sir Dyer Duckworth, and some other leading members of his own profession in London had the pleasure of hearing Dr MacPhail express in his own pleasant way some views on problems which are to-day occupying the attention of thinking Canadians.

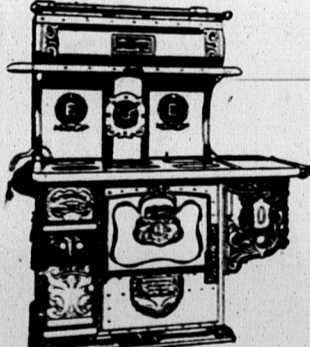
