BELL WINS
Results Show Liberal Majority Fifty Six.
Great Interest Manifested in The Election in East Prince.

There was a deep interest taken in the East Prince by-election yesterday throughout the whole province. The Liberal majority in that district in 1896 being only 117 and with the candidates and conditions now entirely changed, little idea could be formed as to the result. Up to a late hour last night as the returns were coming in large crowds gathered at THE GUARDIAN offices and at different places where the results were to be had. Interest grew intense when the last three or four places were being waited for, as it looked then as though Mr. Bell's majority, which was just about what would cover that gain of the Conservative at the remaining places in the last election and there was no saying who would win the day. About nine o'clock a wire heard from Envyvale and Bell's majority was 54. This place gave a majority in favor of the Conservative in the last election of 41 and if the electors in this polling division had not changed their politics, the total majority for the Liberal candidate would be very small and there was a possibility of his being defeated. Shortly before 10 o'clock word reached the city that Kinkora's figures were in dispute and when verified might make a serious change, but before another hour elapsed, the first report was claimed to be correct, which decided the question more definitely. Now for Envyvale; this place is situated about six miles from a telephone and the distance, coupled with the severe cold weather, no doubt caused the delay and many an anxious one went to his home in doubt as to who would be successful. But eleven o'clock brought the deciding votes and Envyvale spoke with certain sound. A great fight is reported to have been put up in each of the polling places, the keenest some say ever witnessed. Some minor changes in the polling divisions have been made since 1896 as will be seen by comparing the two lists. The names of three places have been changed and a new polling district has been opened in North Bedouque. The voting lists have also been changed in accordance with the Franchise Act passed at the last session of parliament. A. O. F.—Regular meeting of Court Gladstone, Wright's Hall, this evening at 8 o'clock. Election of officers.
The S. S. Stanley was ordered from Pictou to Buetoche yesterday to look after the buoys there and it is expected that she will come to Charlottetown some time today.
THE S. S. Jacques Carrier on her way to Orwell yesterday attempted to call at Halliday's Wharf but when within about 200 yards of it the ice was found to be too solid to risk venturing farther and she returned to Charlottetown.
THE S. S. Nothumb land arrived here from Summerside last night shortly after twelve, having found the ice in Summerside harbor too heavy to risk remaining any longer. She will leave for Pictou this morning at 9 o'clock taking the mails.

Mrs. HENRY, of Calgary, accompanied by her daughter, arrived in the city last night and were the guests of Mr. B. Tombs. They proceeded to Charlottetown this morning where they will spend several weeks visiting friends.—Traverse.
