## The Campaign Issues

(Mail and Empire)

As election day approaches voters of all political stripes should get a few facts firmly fixed in their minds.

In the first place they should vote for Canada and the welfare of the Canadian people rather than for any political party as such. With this end in view they should consider the records of the respective leaders, who are seeking their franchises.

Let us first take Mr. King's achievements. Under him:

1. Canada increased its national debt on account of the C.N.R. by hundreds of millions of dollars.
2. During a world boom nothing was laid up against the inevitable lean years.
3. Canada crashed into economic depression.
4. Canada lost its American and European markets.
5. Tariff laws were passed at Washington which reduced Canada's exports of farm products to the republic from \$175,000,000 in 1921 to a little over \$3,000,000 a year.
6. Our exports of other products to the United States were similarly inhibited.

Let us now recall some of the things that Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett has achieved. Under the Government headed by him:

1. Canada's farmers and workers have been protected against an avalanche of goods from other countries which refused to buy from us.
2. Canada's farmers and primary producers and some of our manufacturers have obtained a preferred, sheltered market in the United Kingdom so that our exports to the Empire have increased 100 per cent.
3. Our exporters have obtained similar reciprocal preferences in other parts of the Empire.
4. Our exports have obtained improved positions in the market of France, Germany, Austria, Poland and Brazil.
5. Our ordinary controllable public expenditures have been reduced by \$90,000,000 a year.
6. Over-burdened farmers have been enabled to lighten their load of debt so that they can remain upon the land.
7. They have been placed in a position where they can borrow money at 5 per cent.
8. By conversion loans at lower interest rates the country has been saved \$20,000,000 a year.
9. The National credit has been placed on such a high level that the Government has been enabled to borrow money at the lowest interest rate in Canada's history.
10. Canada has become the fifth exporting nation in the world.
11. It does a larger share of the world's business than it did in 1929 under Mr. King.
12. An adverse trade balance of \$103,000,000 under Mr. King has been transformed into a favorable trade balance of \$152,000,000.
13. The number of unemployed has been so reduced that as many people are at work today as in 1926.
14. A check has been placed upon stock-watering and other kinds of stock exchange exploitation which flourished under the King Government and ruined tens of thousands of Canadians when the boom broke toward the close of the Liberal regime.
15. An inhibition has been placed upon the merger-mongering which flourished under Liberal rule and greatly added to the financial disaster of 1929.
16. Protection has been afforded to investors by a stricter regulation of financial and industrial flotations.
17. Various groups of agriculturists have been placed in a position to market their products under more profitable conditions than those which have heretofore existed.
18. Wage-earners have been granted an eight-hour day and a forty-eight hour week, together with one day's rest in seven; these provisions having already resulted in the taking on of thousands of new hands by important industries.
19. Wage-earners are being benefited by machinery for the enforcement of minimum wages.
20. The workers have been granted an employment and social insurance commission to administer a national system of unemployment insurance and to work out a scheme of health insurance.
21. The workers have been granted a national housing policy, which provides for the expenditure of \$50,000,000 in the erection of small homes.
22. Now as to the future! When the Bennett Government is returned to power (1) a Federal loan council will undertake the work of consolidating Canada's domestic debts, Federal, provincial, municipal and railway, upon a more interest basis, but without compulsion and without interfering with the rights of foreign bondholders; (2) workers over sixty years will have the privilege of retiring on pensions so that room may be made for younger people; (3) the provisions of the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act will be extended to urban and suburban householders so that debts may be lightened with the co-operation of their creditors on a voluntary basis.
23. Thus far Mr. Mackenzie King has enunciated no programme that can appeal to any large element of the population. He is still repeating the old speeches to which the country has been used for many years past.
24. The contrast between the two leaders of the two main political parties is so pronounced that the public appears to have weakened to it. Hence the vote of popular opinion in favor of Mr. Bennett which has been rising lately.

## N. B. To Open Up Million Acre Forest

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)  
FRIDERICHTON, N. B., Oct. 11.—Two survey parties of 14 men each were being assembled today to lay the course of a new highway through virgin territory from east to west in Northern New Brunswick, linking tidewater at Newcastle with the upper waters of the St. John River at Plaster Rock.

In making this announcement Premier Dymally stated that the primary objective of the project was to open up a million acres of hardwood stands and to provide access to tide water.

In addition, he said, it would open one of the finest game hunting and fishing areas in the province and would provide a more accessible route for tourists seeking the resorts along the eastern coast.

The Premier's statement contained no indication of the type of construction or the cost of the highway. The total cost of the undertaking has been estimated unofficially at more than \$2,000,000. While the span between Plaster Rock and Newcastle is 96 miles, the new highway extending from Quarryville, the eastern extremity of the new development, to Plaster Rock will cover between 80 and 85 miles.

Commencing at Plaster Rock, the road will proceed eastward up the Wapke River almost to its head, crossing to the headwaters of Clearwater Stream, spanning the divide between the Tobique and the Miramichi, crossing the headwaters of the Bangor and then following the waters of the Renous River to Quarryville.

The survey parties will pitch camp early next week and it is expected they will have advanced their work sufficiently within six weeks to place between 200 and 300 men on the job clearing and burning. The survey party operating from the western end at Plaster Rock is to be under the direction of W. M. Costigan, Grand Falls while the second party, operating from Quarryville, will be in charge of George McKinnon, Fredericton.

Of the 1,000,000 acres of hardwood territory being opened for development, fully 80 per cent is Crown Land, the Premier said. Yellow birch, maple, beech and white birch are prevalent.
