WILL SERVE FOR ONE MORE YEAR

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 26.—One more year now, and C. G. Gillespie is through as the "Ozar" of Maritime sport. The veteran Moncton, N. B., sportsman declared today he would not offer for re-election next year as President of the Maritime Provinces branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

President Gillespie was tendered a unanimous return to office at yesterday's annual meeting of the Branch.

He will head its affairs for the coming year, he said today, but after that he will not consider accepting the office again.

ST. LOUIS BROWNS FOR MONTREAL?

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Baseball's Stove Leaguers were seeing along Broadway yesterday. Death of Philip De Catesby Ball, owner of St. Louis Browns of the American League, added explosive fuel to the flaming question that has been in the minds of experts and others for some time: Where will the Browns end?

Montreal is considered the most logical city to move the franchise to, although there is a possibility objections could be overcome regarding transfer of the Club to Milwaukee.

Two well known Montreal sportsmen have been known to have persistently bid for the Brown franchise in the last 18 months. United States observers have willingly admitted the Canadian Metropolitans is the best bet from a baseball viewpoint and major league ball in Montreal seems nearer reality today than ever.

It is taken for granted in most quarters that the Brown franchise will be disposed of by the Ball heirs.

Only a stubborn determination to produce an American League pennant winner had kept the late St. Louis magnate in the game, it has been disclosed by a close friend. The latter made it known Ball had suffered losses approximately \$3,000,000 in his fruitless 18-year effort to produce a championship Club.

Should the Club be moved to Montreal, it is taken for granted Hornsby will be retained as manager unless the Canadians secure the franchise and players outright. In that case they could fulfil Hornsby's contract by a financial settlement.

CLEVELAND CLUB DROPPED FROM CIRCUIT

International League Circuit to Have Five Teams This Season.

DETROIT, Oct. 26.—(A.P.)—The Cleveland Club will be dropped from the International Hockey League this year, leaving a five team circuit, it was announced tonight following an all day meeting of Club and League officials here.

Manager Harry Holmes, whose Indians finished in last place last season, and deep in the hole financially, told his story to the league, and the Cleveland franchise was declared inoperative, for at least one year.

The players on the Cleveland squad will be divided among four of the five remaining teams. The Olympics, of Detroit, waived their claims to any of the players, and they will go to the Windsor, London, Syracuse and Buffalo clubs.

Conn Announces Wolverine Lineup

Halifax Manager Confident That Nova Scotia Team Will Win League — Stuart To Coach.

HALIFAX, Oct. 26.—Personnel of the team that will set out this season in search of the Maritime Hockey League title for the Halifax Wolverines Club was announced tonight following the club's annual meeting. It includes most of last year's players, bolstered by four Quebec and Upper Canadian imports.

Jack Conn, re-elected club president and team manager, said he was confident the Wolves would capture the League championship held by the Moncton Hawks, Allan Cup holders.

He declared he was hopeful of excellent results from the team's new coach, "Red" Stuart. There will be no earth of material. The squad includes last year's first-string players: Goalie Leo Sergeant, Defencemen, Frank Graham and Frank Lavigne, Forwards Chummie Lawlor, Vince Ferguson and Owen Lennon and there are Gordon Kennedy, Ernie Mosher, Reg Shields and Todds Beazley of last year's squad.

The new comers are Gerald "Sham" Harrigan, who played in Quebec for the last few years; Paul Gagnon of the Montreal City League; Bill Cowley and Everett Porteous of Ottawa, and Goalie Game-on, who tended nets for the Intermediate Wolverines when they won the provincial championship last year. In addition, try-outs have been extended to two Amherst, N. S., players, Adelard Fagan and Docithe White.

Before the opening of the season on Nov. 20, the Wolves will play two or three exhibition games at the Halifax Forum. They will take the ice for the first time next Friday. Tomorrow, they will begin active training under Stuart's watchful eye on the Wanderers Grounds.

This season, Conn said tonight, the Club would not sponsor an intermediate team. Instead, attention would be given to the development of Junior material, and Stuart would coach the club's juniors.

At today's annual meeting of the Club Dr. F. R. Little was re-elected Secretary, A. J. O'Brien was named Vice-President, and A. J. Clancy as treasurer.

HELLER IS INJURED

With "Cooney" Welland and Nick Wasnie absentees from the workout, coach George Boucher had his forward trios shifted somewhat. Wasnie laid up on the advice of physicians on account of strained muscles, while Welland likewise was reported indisposed.

BOSTON BRUINS NEARLY INTACT

QUEBEC, Oct. 26.—Arrival of big Ne's Stewart, 12 pounds lighter than at the same period last year, and the only two holdovers of the team, Marty Barry and Dit Clapper, brought the Boston Bruins practically to full strength when they took the ice in practice for the National League campaign.

Only Eddie Shore was missing. Eddie was delayed at his Saskatchewan farm but was expected within a day or two.

Art Ross was an experimenting with his forward lines. He had Stewart working with Joe Lamb on right wing and Alex Smith and Lionel Hitchman as defense and "Tiny" Thompson in the nets.

Opposing was a line made up of Marty Barry, centre; Clapper at right and Bob Gracie, left. Bill Cunningham and Weir were on defence with Emile Lemontagne, of Quebec Beavers in goal.

A third line Ross used was composed of "Peggy" O'Neil, centre, with Sheldon Buckles on left and Frank Jerwa right.

Harry O'Leary, Oss Haxlmer and Johnny Sheppard practiced with the Bruins' Cubs in the afternoon.

ADVOCATES AN EMPIRE RUGBY TOURNAMENT

LONDON, Oct. 26.—(C.P. Cable)—Sir Thomas M. Wilford, New Zealand's High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, today advocated an Empire rugby football tournament between teams from Canada, England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.

The High Commissioner, speaking at a luncheon in Wembley Stadium, where the next Empire Games and swimming events will be held, said New Zealand was most anxious that such a tournament should be held, and that he hoped, Canada, even if unable to muster a team as strong as those of other Empire countries would compete.

Games in an intra-Empire rugby football tournament would be played under English rules with teams of 15 men each.
