### HOW ESSEX APPEARED AS ROMANTIC COUNTY

**MANCHESTER, England, April 26.**—(By The Canadian Press)—"An eminent traveller has declared Essex to be a dreary county, devoid of charm or history," says a correspondent of The Manchester Guardian, "yet a map of Essex once saved a man from possible insanity." The correspondent thereupon relates the following story:

"Home-sickness reaches a terrible intensity in desert places. The man was isolated in the Arabian Desert, 90 miles of hot sand from the nearest oasis, exhausted, with a dwindling water supply, and dependent upon the fortune of a single Arab dispatched to the oasis for relief. There was but one color, a vivid febrile yellow that ate into the mind. The man was 3,000 miles from England.

"But among his maps was a half-inch-to-the-mile sheet of Essex. Somehow, while packing for the expedition many months previously at home, it had been slipped in among the desert charts. It was a green map, with estuaries and sheets of water printed in blue, with large forest areas picked out in conventional trees. It was cool and quiet and comely. It was England. On it the man read such names as these: Magdalen Laver, Woodriddon, Molehill, Green, Abbess Roding, Good Easter. They acted as a lulling sedative upon nerves that were taunted to fracture-point. The peace of England, the soft sounds of moving leaves and splashing water and bird song were suddenly present. When the Arab returned with water, help, and two fresh camels, he found the man sleeping, refreshed, and normal."

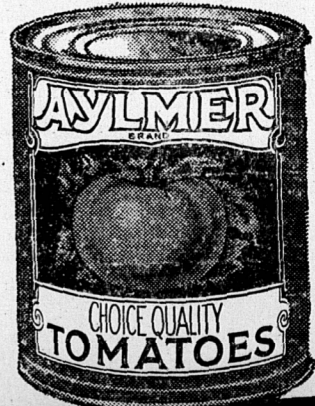

## A Healthful FOOD and a Tonic DRINK

### UTTER 1,120,000 WORDS AT LEGISLATIVE SESSION

**EDMONTON, Alta., April 26.**—(By The Canadian Press)—The session of the Alberta legislature that has just passed into the annals of history released upon the air at least 1,120,000 words. And that does not take into account numerous committee meetings. Apart from them the legislative session, which ran into its ninth week, was a wordy event.

There were 44 sittings of the house, which would approximate 140 hours of actual working time. On good talking days—which means pretty nearly always—any respectable and well lubricated legislature can discharge, produce and utter a minimum of 8,000 words an hour.

Multiplying 140 (hours) by 8000 (words) we get, arithmetically, a grand total of 1,120,000 words as the combined verbal discharge of the session.

On the basis of sessional indemnities for 63 members it figures out to exactly 11.20 cents a word, which is a higher rate than any newspaper in Canada pays for space rates—and words quite as good.

But at that, the Alberta legislature doesn't seem to be unique. Close to 250,000 words were delivered in the

first ten days of the parliament at Ottawa.

### PAESTUM EXCAVATIONS NEARING COMPLETION

**NAPLES, April 26.**—The excavations of the Forum at Paestum, the ancient city of Greek origin, are nearing completion. The Forum, which was added to the Hellenic city in Roman times, measures about 65 yards by 160, and numerous remains of temples, law courts, stores and houses have appeared.

Paestum possesses the two finest Greek temples out of Greece, and with the new excavations the old city is revealing its topography clearly.

### DESIGNS SOUGHT FOR NEW QUARTER

**WASHINGTON, April 26.**—Secretary of Treasury Mellon soon will invite artists throughout the country to submit designs for a new 25-cent piece which will be issued next year in connection with the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of George Washington.

The coin will be the first to bear the image of Washington. It is authorized by legislation passed in the closing days of the last session of Congress.

On the front of the 25-cent piece now in use is a full-length figure of a woman, while the back is engraved with an eagle in flight.
