about an average of one pupil in each district each year aspires to go farther than the public school at the present time. If there were a school teaching Agriculture and Domestic Science together with a good broad course in subjects basic to living in the country, as Canadian and British History, Civics, Chemistry, Physics, Botany, English and Geometry, and if all these were taught in an agricultural and not an academic manner, it would do much to solve the educational difficulties of P. E. Island and provide an education for pupils who do not want to teach or preach or study law. Such a high school would be a preliminary for an agricultural college and would put P. E. Island in line with what is being done in all progressive States and Provinces in America—though it would still be far behind what is done for agriculture in European countries.
What would be the use of consolidating schools in P. E. Island as recommended by the Education Commission if the present course of study is adhered to? The result would be simply to fill the teaching and other professions and these graduates would go to Western Canada later for larger opportunities. If an educational course were planned to train the pupil for his vocation in life then we can expect to have trained men stay in P. E. Island, for agricultural opportunities are fully as great there as in any part of Canada and life is even sweeter.
I hope no legislator at least will think that the Consolidated School has been aiming simply to turn out teachers and fill the professions. That is not a correct standard of judgment for that school.

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CUSTOMS MEN 'MUST WORK'

WASHINGTON, March 24—"A full day's work for every full day's pay is the order which has been flashed to every custom house in the United States by direction of Secretary MacVeagh. It applies to every man in the customs service from collectors holding choice appointments with salaries running into four figures to the stevedore who hustles freight on the dock at a day wage.
Special agents of the customs service, who have quietly investigated calls for more help made by collectors at several large ports, have told Secretary MacVeagh that a full day's work from every man will make the customs service equal to its task and probably save the government thousands of dollars a year by sidetracking proposed increases.
Secretary MacVeagh has instructed Chief Wilkie of the special agents to see that the order is enforced.

ARREST HUSBAND AT GRAVE OF WIFE

FREDERICK, Okla., March 24—As the first clouds of earth fell on the coffin of Mrs. Rena V. Gregory in the burial ground at Navajo, near here, an officer, arrested Mac Gregory, her husband, on a charge of murder. The coffin was taken from the grave and the body removed for examination.
Mrs. Gregory died on Sunday, supposedly of heart disease. Physicians who attended her are said to have discovered evidences of strychnine poisoning just before the burial.

WESTERN FISH FOR AMERICAN MARKETS

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Wheat for years has been leading product for that honor in fish, according to United States Consul General Jones at Winnipeg.
The fishing industry has developed to such an extent that it ranks second to wheat in importance, says the Consul.
For years the States along the international border were dependent upon Manitoba for fresh fish, but recent years have witnessed the introduction of Manitoba fish on the general markets of the United States. The middle states are the principal consumers but frequently fish from that district have found their way to the markets as far south as Maryland. The catch is made in Lake Winnipeg.

A GREAT STRUGGLE IN THE GREAT WEST.

CALGARY, March 28—All plans are completed for the strike for all the miners in Alberta and British Columbia on April first.
The railways and towns are laying in large stores of fuel, and Toronto jobbers have been urged to send cargoes of coal up the lakes on the first boats after navigation opens. The C. P. R. will be chiefly involved, and many large smelters.
It will be the final struggle of the open shop, and the mine owners are determined not to yield. Fifteen thousand miners are involved.
