MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 9.—Wholesale prices continued to hold unchanged Saturday. The recent weekly advances in prices of butter, cheese and eggs however, were abated this week with yesterday's prices showing no change from the prices at the beginning of the week. Wholesale butter prices for eastern townships, No. 1 stood at 39 1/2 while solids to the trade were quoted at 41 cents per pound and prints 42 cents. Trading in the cheese section was quiet and prices were generally quoted at 18 1/2 cents per lb. For No. 1 Ontario White and Colored with the Quebec White and Colored at 18 cents per lb. Egg prices were somewhat easier with wholesale cartot prices being quoted at 43 for Extras; 33 for Firsts and 28 for Seconds for Ontario points. Asking prices for Western eggs were 43 for Extras 39 for Firsts and 40 for Seconds for Vancouver retail prices were unchanged. Couver retail prices were unchanged.

BOY'S PARLIAMENT MEETS IN EDMONTON

JASPER Alta., Sept. 9.—Youth place in the National life of Canada and its relation to leadership of the future will be one of the main subjects of discussion during the forthcoming week, when representatives of the Six Boys Parliaments of Canada will meet in conference at the Edmonton Y. M. C. A. Summer Camp on the shore of Lake Edith about two miles from Jasper Park Lodge in the heart of the Canadian Rockies. The Boys Parliaments of Canada Conference can be said to be truly National in its representation of the youth of Canada, and its representatives gathered today from the Atlantic to the Pacific seaboard, from the Provinces by the Sea, came Joseph Birridg, Premier of the Maritime Boys Parliament, Jim Gibson, Caledonia Ont., is present as Premier of that Province, and is accompanied by Earl Leutenslager Field Secretary of the Ontario Boys Work Board, Jack Dunderdale of Winnipeg, Premier of the Manitoba Boys Parliament is also accompanied by two other members of that body, while Lorne Stewart of Quappelle, Premier of the Saskatchewan Parliament, has also two other members with him, including Wilfred Scott, Secretary in Saskatchewan, and L. Chipperfield, Bob Ralston of Vancouver, as Premier represents British Columbia and is accompanied by Irvine Dawson of Victoria and Jack Diedal of Vancouver, Tom Hay Thorne, Premier of Alberta, has with him Bill Pettigrew of Calgary, a candidate for Premiership of the next Alberta Boys Parliament, Allen Landels, a member of the Parliament and Gordon Lapp, who has been Boys Work Secretary in that Province for the past three years and who is now being succeeded by Tom Hay Thorne.

New Mary Mellish Memorial Library At Mount Allison

Former Island Students of Mount Allison University and friends of the late Mrs. Mary Mellish Archibald in Charlottetown, will be very much interested in the Mary Mellish Library, which now forms a section of the new library at Mount Allison University. This memorial library is the gift of Dr. Raymond Clave Archibald, of Brown's University, Providence, R. I., in memory of his mother Mrs. Mary Archibald Mellish who was a graduate from the college in 1887; teacher, 1889-71; Preceptress, 1871-73 and Lady Principal from 1885 to January, 1901. Mrs. Archibald was born in Pownal, P. E. I., and lived for many years in Charlottetown. This Mary Mellish library consists of 1,200 volumes of English and American poetry and dramas; a complete set of concordances of English poets; 250 selections of songs of all countries with piano accompaniments; 450 books containing 5,000 pieces of poetry and recitations and many other works of the great English and American writers. On the fly leaf of every book is a plate containing the portrait of Mrs. Archibald and a record of her connection with the College, from student to Lady Principal.

The library is beautifully furnished and arranged. Its walls are of a rich shade of ivory and the same color is used for the beamed ceiling. The floor is of brown oak. The hangings are of old rose blush to blend with the upholstery. The wood work including the book cases is of dark oak, as are also the chairs, tables, stools, lounges and piano. The upholstery is of blue silk mohair with a red background. There are eight standard lamps of wrought iron and copper, with hand painted amber shades which, when alight, give a wonderful effect to the room. A very interesting feature of the library is an orthophone credenza model phonograph with 400 records containing musical settings of English poems and dramas; readings from Barrymore; extracts from Shakespeare, and lectures by distinguished English gentlemen. This instrument is used by the Professors of English in connection with their class work.

On the wall are some interesting water colours, including a portrait of Mrs. Archibald; also a picture of the graduating class of 1887, a programme of the graduating exercises and diplomas. This library will appeal more especially to lovers of English and American literature, to which it is chiefly devoted, and will no doubt be of great interest to many visitors from Prince Edward Island.—S.

Crime Experts Meet In Canada

American Prison Congress Gathers in Toronto For Discussion of Crime Problems

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 9.—Prison and delinquent problems and methods adopted in criminology will be discussed at what will be one of the largest conventions held on this continent when the American Prison Congress gathers in Toronto between Sept. 20 and Sept. 25.

For the first time in many years this congress which usually meets in some United States city decided to come over the border. Its delegates will be composed of officers, wardens, and others connected in an executive capacity with the penal institutions of Canada and the United States together with social workers and public officials who come in contact with this phase of work.

Arrangements for the congress are in the hands of Brig-General W. S. Hughes, superintendent of penitentiaries for the Dominion whose office is in Ottawa. The programme for the congress indicates many prominent men in criminological matters will be heard, both from Canada and the United States. It is expected that wardens of penitentiaries and governors of many of the provincial jails in Canada will be present, as well as social workers.

The congress will be interesting for the contrasts it may afford in the viewpoints of administration of prisons, as it is well known that Canadian methods are much more conservative than United States ideas, particularly in the amount of liberty and privilege accorded the inmates of prisons. Canadian prison officials probably will be able to show that their discipline based on the standards of British justice is more effective in controlling crime.

The congress is sponsored by the American Prison Association, headquarters of which are in the city of New York. Objects of that association are:

- (1) Improvement of the laws in relation to public offenses and offenders,
- (2) The study of the causes of crime, the nature of offenders and their social surroundings, the best methods of dealing with offenders and preventing crime;
- (3) Improvement of correctional, penal and reformatory institutions, management and discipline thereof, including the appointment of boards and of other officers;
- (4) Care of, and provision for, paroled and discharged prisoners and probationers, especially such as may have given evidence of reformation.

Co-operation with the American Prison Association are certain kindred or subsidiary bodies, including the Warden's Association, the National Prisoners' Aid Association, the Chaplains' Association, the National Conference of Juvenile Agencies.

The deliberations of the congress are divided up into sectional interests under committee headings. Thus there are papers given on various aspects of work and problems arising from the committee on jails, the committee on probation, the committee on pardon and parole, the committee on criminal law and statistics, the committee on prevention, the committee on public control and super-

Branch Meeting P. E. I. Teachers Held At Souris

A branch meeting of the Prince Edward Island Teacher's Federation was held at Souris, Friday, August 30, 1929. The president, Mr. Russell Leard presided. In the course of his address the president referred to the activities of the Royal Commission the support received by the Island teachers from the Canadian Federation; the advantages which would result from an independent board of education. He also expressed his appreciation of the splendid support given by the teachers of Eastern Kings to the Federation during the recent crisis.

Mr. Mullin, Supervisor, then addressed the teachers. He expressed his opinion that some of the points of efficiency in good teachers are: keeping of school and surroundings in a clean and tidy condition; interest taken in school affairs and study groups; punctuality and putting in of full time; methods; and enforcing discipline.

Mr. L. W. Shaw, representative of the Department of Education explained the changes in the course of studies. He pointed out the need and use of student reading also some of the mistakes made in teaching oral reading. He urged the teachers to give beginners the first week or so of school free of lessons in order that they become acquainted with their surroundings. An outline of the word and sentence method for beginners and a test in silent reading ended his interesting discourse.

Miss MacLean, organizer of the Red Cross, spoke a few words to the teachers, pointing out the work and benefit of the Junior Branch and asked each teacher to organize a branch where possible.

Mr. Hynes, Supervisor, stressed the benefit of School Fairs, Study Groups, Physical Training, and Home Report Cards.

Mr. Mullin further stressed the benefit of School Fairs and urged the teachers to join in them.

The questions from a well filled question box were then answered. Officers for the coming year were elected as follows:—

President—Mr. Russell Leard.
Secretary—Miss Mary MacDonald.
The following resolutions were read and adopted:

- Resolved that a Junior Red Cross Branch be organized in all schools where such would be at all feasible.
- Resolved that we approve the investigation work of the Royal Commission of Education and urge upon the Board of Education the necessity of implementing its recommendations as soon as possible.
- Resolved that the thanks of the Convention be extended to: Supervisors Shaw, Mullin, Hynes, and McPhee; the parishioners of St. Mary's church for the use of their hall.
- Resolved that the Department of Education place with the secretaries of the various schools all papers, such as agreement notices of engagement, etc., prior to the date of opening.
