(Special to "The Guardian") TORONTO, July 31.—Moderate winds, fine and warm. THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was cloudy, bright and very mild; cloudy at night.

## ALCOHOL

feel its effects. Its cells are stimulated to more abundant secretion. If this action be excessive or too prolonged the secretion of the hepatic cells becomes defective.

On nervous system alcohol acts in moderate doses as an excitant, in large doses as a paralyzant. In moderate doses the higher centres are first stimulated, ideas flow more easily, the senses are more acute, the person has the feeling of increased strength. This is followed by depression. Later the reflex centres of cord are depressed.

On Circulation: After alcohol enters the circulation it has a distinct influence on the heart, acting both on the muscular structure and on the accelerator nerves increasing the force and frequency of ventricular contraction. The vaso-motor system is also affected. All the vessels of body dilate, especially those of the skin, but in spite of this blood pressure rises, the increased action of the heart compensating for the dilatation. In this way we have the blood driven with more force and in larger amount through the organs with the result that they work for the time to greater advantage. The mental faculties are brightened, the muscular strength is increased, more urine is passed and there is a tendency to perspiration. These results are transitory. The heart at first stimulated becomes depressed. In large doses alcohol scarcely stimulates but almost at once depresses and finally paralyzes. Enormous doses may be immediately fatal.

On Respiration: Small doses stimulate slightly, large doses depress. As a Food: Alcohol in small doses is a food.

Therapeutic Action: In small doses alcohol is of service as a stomach tonic. In such cases it should always be given with meals. It is of service in the feeble digestion of old people, in feeble digestion of convalescence and lastly in feeble digestion of fatigue and neurasthenia. Given in small doses with meals it enables the stomach to do work which it otherwise could not do and thus enables the system to appropriate nourishment which it otherwise would not use. Alcohol is of much service as an antiseptic and is used in some forms of summer diarrhoea. In the form of brandy it is of service in some cases of vomiting. One of its most important uses is as a rapidly acting cardiac stimulant and is therefore of much value in sudden syncope attacks, also in depression caused by sudden shock. It is constantly prescribed as cardiac stimulant in aches, fevers and in acute inflammatory and depressive diseases of all cases of anaemia of the brain, and may be used to relieve pain and to promote and quiet delirium. It should be remembered that neurotic subjects are very liable to acquire the habit and hence alcohol is a dangerous drug for such. In cases of pneumonia you can literally pour in the alcohol into your every half hour in urgent cases and we get none of the ill-effects which we get in health. This is often done in tiding your patient over the critical period.

Alcohol in large doses increases the power of resistance to septic poisons and is used freely in cases of septicæmia and puerperal fever.

On heart and circulation: Careful experiments have proven that alcohol in moderate doses does not increase the efficiency of the heart action. Blood pressure is not raised. A large and toxic dose acts as a depressant to the heart muscle and to the arterial system and produces a notable fall in blood pressure. Numerous observations on healthy men have shown that alcohol in ordinary doses produces no appreciable change in the pulse rate or in the blood pressure. The results of the experiments by Dr. Cabot in the Massachusetts General Hospital and Dr. Grille of Cleveland, proved conclusively, that, as far as could be measured by the instruments at their disposal the action of alcohol upon the circulation was nil.

On Respiratory System: The effect of alcohol on the respiratory system may be summed up in a similar manner, viz., in moderate doses it has little effect as a respiratory stimulant.

On Nervous System: The first effect is one of apparent stimulation with indications of increased mental and motor activity. This effect is not due to the direct action of alcohol on the centres controlling their activity, but to a depressing action on the higher inhibitory centres. The true effect of alcohol is a depressing one. Experiments have shown that alcohol does not increase either the mental functions or the activity of the motor centres of the brain. On the contrary it distinctly lessens the capacity for work even when the doses are small, while with full doses the numbing effects become very prominent.

Alcohol in small doses does not influence the course and severity of infection, and in large doses it lessens the power of resistance of the organism. In infection of all forms alcohol should be used cautiously. In

large doses it may and probably will do harm.

Alcohol, in disease, is a valuable food replacing carbohydrates and metabolism. It places no tax on the digestive organs. On the contrary, if used intelligently, it increases their secretion, thus, in low and asthenic conditions assisting the digestion and favoring the absorption of other foods. We must remember, however, that the food value of alcohol is easily surpassed if too much be taken. Usually not more than one and a half ounces of an equivalent of pure alcohol can be utilized daily within food limits.

## CONSENSUS OF OPINION.

It is hardly necessary to give any further evidence to show that there has been a decided change in the teaching regarding the action and the therapeutic use of alcohol. Thompson, in his last edition on practical Dietetics sums up the general discussion of the value of alcohol as follows:

1. The use of alcohol in any form is unnecessary for the human organism in health.

2. A large number of persons are undoubtedly better without alcohol and may prolong their lives by total abstinence.

3. The lifelong use of alcohol in moderation as an occasional beverage with meals does not necessarily shorten the duration of life or induce disease in some persons, while in others it subtly produces gradual and permanent changes chiefly of a curvilinear character.

4. There are many persons whose constitutional inheritance of inebriety is such that they should be warned particularly against the use of alcohol.

5. The abuse of alcoholic stimulation is invariably injurious, although the extent to which evil influences become manifest depends upon the constitution of the individual.

6. There are few diseases in which the temporary use of alcohol is of positive service and there are certain cases in which it becomes a necessity in order to prolong life.

7. In certain cases of malnutrition and malassimilation of food, alcohol is itself a food and its consumption under proper direction results in an increase of body weight and strength and improvement of functional activity.

## CHANGE IN PRACTICE

Not only has there been a change in the teaching but there is also a great change in the actual practice of the use of alcohol in disease. The records of many of the large hospitals have been examined both in England and America and it is invariably found that the cost of alcohol each year in the form of wines, spirits, beer and porter has gradually decreased while the amount of money paid for milk each year has gradually increased and the proportion of decrease in the former is very similar to the proportion of increase in the latter. Just to give one example. In the Salisbury Infirmary we find that in 1870 the cost of alcohol in the form of wines, etc. was £310 and the cost of milk for that year was £94 while in 1905 the cost of alcohol was only £18 and the money paid for milk that year was £317. At the same time the number of patients had increased.

Mr. Pearce Gould of the Middlesex Hospital writes: "For many years I have dispensed almost entirely with alcohol as an aid in surgical treatment. As a student I saw it used as a matter of routine for every kind of surgical malady except head injuries and in my earlier years I naturally followed the practice of my teachers, but as soon as I made trial for myself of the effects of withholding alcohol I found how entirely over-rated its value was and how greatly mistaken had been the teaching. Anything like a free use of alcohol is strongly to be deprecated. It is as pitifully injurious as is the free unrestricted use of morphia. Either drug in moderation may be useful but in excess only adds to the patient's misery."

Sir William Broadbent on the use of alcohol in medicine writes: "It may be said at once that alcohol has no place in the treatment of weakness in childhood. In the anaemia and chlorosis of adolescence it is of very doubtful advantage and this or that wine recommended as containing iron often does more harm than good. The most dangerous employment of stimulants at any period of life is when they are allowed to be taken for the relief of depression, or of sensations described as sinking, or of subjective feelings of weakness even if accompanied by weakness of pulse."

It is interesting to note the difference in the space devoted to alcohol in Osler's Principles and Practice of Medicine in the earlier and later editions under the head of treatment.
