### SURGEONS TRANSPLANT MAN'S SHINBONE TO RENEW PART OF A WOMAN'S

She Was Poor and Needed the Leg to Enable Her to Earn Her Living Otherwise It Would Have Been Amputated Not Patched

NEW YORK, July 16.—By grafting the shinbone of a man on to a woman suffering from necrosis, thus practically giving her a whole new lower leg, Dr. Henry W. Frauenthal has performed an operation unique in surgery—one in which the daring was justified by the result since it saved the limb.

Up to now operations of this sort have been confined to experimental work done on dogs by Dr. Alexis Carrel at the Rockefeller Institute. With Dr. Frauenthal it was a case of amputating the deceased leg above the knee or putting in a new tibia. It was done at the Hospital for Deformities and Joint Diseases.

The first essential was to get a good healthy bone to take the place of the one eaten by disease. After a time one of the hospitals which handles emergency cases reported that a man had been killed in an accident. As the body was unclaimed and would have gone either to Potter's Field or the dissecting table, requisition was made for one of the legs, from which the tibia was taken. It was kept in an ice box, immersed in a strong salt solution, until the surgeon was ready to use it.

The new bone put in was about eight inches long, an inch thick and an inch and a half wide. It weighed one or two ounces less than half a pound. Scientists are divided as to whether in the case of grafting such as this the new bone actually becomes part of the structure of the body and remains in it, or if it acts as a framework, while nature builds a new bone, gradually eliminating the transplanted one as the newer gains in strength and size.

So rigid in its place is the engrafted bone that it was not necessary to put on stiff bandages. It will grow into the other at the joints at the top and bottom, and as the flesh gathers about it and the blood circulates through it it will become an integral part of the leg, not even a sign of lameness indicating its presence.

Several of the foremost surgeons of the city had advised immediate amputation. She had been shifted from four institutions, which found it a hardship on the other inmates to keep her. As she is dependent upon herself for her livelihood, she begged that her leg not be taken off. So the doctor decided upon the grafting.

After she had gone under the ether the surgeon cut away all the flesh around the bone for a space of about ten inches. This left exposed the tibia and its companion bone, the fibula, around which some flesh was left as the back part of the leg was healthier than the rest.

EIGHT INCH SECTION OF OLD BONE CUT OUT.

The periosteum, which is the membrane protecting the bone, was carefully cut away and then eight inches of the bone was chiselled out. It was impossible, because of its condition, to take it out as a whole. The top and bottom of the tibia, which were in fair condition, were sawed through just below the top and just above the bottom, so as to give anchorage to the new bone.

This was cut a fraction of an inch longer than the space it was to fill and then wedged into position, held solidly by the pressure of either end, both of which had been roughened so as to get the increased holding strength. Before it worked into place it was necessary to hammer it heavily.

Then the edges of the flesh were drawn together by stitches, which still left a gap of easily an inch and a half. Before this the wound was covered with rubber tissue under which the flesh will grow. Also the periosteum was carefully sewn together, to give the new bone all possible support and protection while it is growing to the remnants of the old.

When the flesh has filled in the opening through which the tibia shows, skin will be grafted from the hips and breast and back of the patient in quantity sufficient to cover the leg, which is now raw from the ankle to the knee.

THE SUCCESS OF OPERATION TESTED. By way of testing the success of the operation and at the same time of assuring that the new bone was in proper position, the patient was lifted while still under the anaesthetic and made to put her weight on the leg. It snapped into a tighter connection and bore the pressure quite as well as if it had always been there.

ST JOHNSBURY, Vt., July 14.—Harry Munsey was lured from the house of his employer, Charles Harvey of Passumpsic, last night to a lonely cross road and assaulted by three masked men.

Following an investigation by the authorities four men, two of them the wealthiest citizens of Orleans county, were arrested today by Deputy Sheriff M. C. Garfield of Walden.

The account of the assault reads like the tar and feather days, and was an attempt to kidnap Munsey, who it is alleged, has caused trouble between Nelson Stevens, a wealthy real estate dealer of Barton, and his wife.

Ray Stiles of New Britain, Conn., a brother of Mrs Stevens, calling himself a representative of a detective agency of Boston, called on Munsey for so-called information against Stevens, and asked him to drive with him so they could talk privately.

They drove to a lonely cross-road where three masked men, said to be Stevens, William Hanson of Barton and Edgerton of Danville, attempted to gag him and tie his hands. He fought furiously, and, bruised and bleeding, escaped from them, giving the alarm.

States Attorney R. W. Simonds and Sheriff W. H. Worthen of St. Johnsbury, with his deputies, investigated and the men were traced by their automobile tracks to Barton.

All four pleaded guilty, and are held in \$800 bail for the present term of Caledonia County Court.

The men claim that they intended no harm to Munsey other than to gag him and carry him to the southern part of the State, frightening him so he would never return.

The matrimonial trouble of the Stevens began a year ago, when Munsey and his wife were working for Stevens. The latter was jealous of Munsey and the public separation followed, Stevens' wife going to East Burke to live and Munsey's wife leaving for parts unknown.

JEALOUS DOGS COST GIRL LIFE NEW YORK, July 14.—An attack which for two years had existed between a young girl and two Great Danes had a tragic ending tonight when Helen Weimann, 15 years old, was killed by falling on a knife on the table. She was lying on the table which the two dogs overturned while striving to attract her notice from another dog. The girl died a few minutes after her fall and in the presence of her mother, who was standing beside the table when the dogs overturned it.

The Danes resented the presence of a terrier. The girl lay at full length upon the kitchen table. She was carrying the terrier when the Danes came loping into the room.

With whines of jealousy they began circling around the table and poking their paws and noses at the girl to distract her attention from the terrier. Then, as one of them tried to leap on the table, she seized a heavy carving knife and tapped the animal on the nose with the handle of it. As she lay holding the knife, with the blade toward her, the other Great Dane leaped against the table and it went over. Miss Weimann slipped to the floor, with the knife under her.

HID IN NEW YORK 4 YEARS. NEW YORK, July 14.—A four years' hunt for Charles Warwick Tindell by the Massachusetts authorities ended here tonight when he was arrested by central office detectives on a charge of grand larceny, and locked up to await the arrival of extradition papers from Boston.

Lindell is accused of stealing \$3100 from Austin Baldwin & Co., steamship brokers of Boston and this city. Up to four years ago he was employed in the New York office of Baldwin & Co. as a confidential clerk. In 1907 he was indicted in Boston, but, according to the police, disappeared and was thought to have gone to England, where an unavailing search was instituted for him.
