2 WEEKEND WINS FOR LEAFS, RANGERS

Canadiens Return To Form To Defeat Maroons 3-2; Rangers And Leafs Winners

MONTREAL, Jan. 13. — (C.P.) — The pep and brilliance which have carried Montreal Canadiens to world honors in other years returned to the club last night as, at full strength for the first time in the National Hockey League season, they ripped into Montreal Maroons for a 3-2 win.

Victory took them at least temporarily out of the bottom place draw with St. Louis Eagles in the Canadian section of the league and gave 10,000 of their supporters — it was a Canadien home game — confidence the club has the power to start a winning streak that may make it a real contender.

The game was one of the most bruising and exciting seen in Montreal this year. Both defenses used their bodies effectively to slow down incoming forwards. The speedy pace and the heavy checking began to tell in the final period and the game slowed down somewhat, but the suspense was kept up right till the final minute, with five Maroons peppering shots at the agile Wilf Cude in the Canadian nets in a vain effort to force the game into overtime.

One of the prettiest solo efforts of the year, a beautiful rush by the veteran defenceman Sylvio Mantha, gave the Canadien the victory. With the score tied at 2-2, Mantha snared the puck at his own blue line, and slowly stalked his way through the whole Maroon team, climaxing the dash with a sliding drive that caught the far corner of the net, completely fooling Alex Connell.

Holding a clear edge in the first period, Maroons were not long in going ahead. Russ Blinco, blonde centre wizard, snared a pass from Earl Robinson in the second minute of play and made no mistake with his shot. Aurel Joliat evaded natters just as Herb Cain jumped on the ice from the penalty box. The veteran winger slipped out of a mangle to snap up Pete Lepine's rebound and backed it home.

Just five minutes later Maroons had their chance and they made no mistake. Sylvio Mantha and Nels Crutchfield were waved to the penalty box in quick succession and Maroons, with a two-man edge, rained through to pepper Cude with shots. Finally Dave Trotter snared a loose puck a few feet from the goal and drove for the corner. Cude was unable to get his leg to the speeding puck in time and Maroons again took the lead.

Leroy Goldsworthy, last year with Chicago Black Hawks, got the equalizer after eight minutes of the second period on a nice play with Jack Riley.

Maroons were without their star centre, Hooley Smith. Smith had three front teeth broken in the game with Chicago Black Hawks here, Thursday and had to have them extracted. Dutch Gainer filled his place between Baldy Northcott and Jimmy Ward.

"Kid Line" Lead Parade

TORONTO, Jan. 13. — (C.P.) — The "kid line" guns that have made more noise and wrought more havoc along the National League hockey front than any other combination of weapons in the current engagements have lost none of their deadly effectiveness against Chicago's Stanley Cup Black Hawks. Some teams may have learned something about silencing the Toronto howlers, but the Hawks' "kid line" is still the league's point-makers with a three-goal spurge, the Leafs upset the Hawks 5-1 here last night, making it three straight victories over the world champions this season. ALLOTTED POSTS ON OLYMPIC SKATING TEAM

Eddie Schroeder, Chicago, and Delbert Lamb, Milwaukee, Secure Berths On Squad.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) — MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 13.—Eddie Schroeder of Chicago and Delbert Lamb of Milwaukee today won two of the four places allotted the United States 1936 Olympic skating team.

Competing here with nearly two score of the nation's best blade artists to determine the country's Olympic skating team, they won the 1,500 and 500 metre events, respectively, to assure their membership on the team. The other two members will be chosen in the 5,000 metre event Tuesday night and the 10,000 metre event Saturday.

Schroeder, a member of the team in 1932, won the long event in 2:33.6 from a field of 38 of the nation's best blade performers, and Lamb won the shorter opening event in 44.4.

Only a small crowd witnessed the races in two-below zero weather following postponement from Saturday when a near blizzard forced delay. The 5,000 metre competition is set for Tuesday night and the 10,000 for Saturday.

Allan Potts of New York finished the 500 metre event in 45.9 and jumped the run, and second place was given to Bob Peterson of Milwaukee in 46.5. Lawrence Goldthwaite, Boston, was next with 46.6.

Finishing with the second best time in the 1,500 metre race was Lamb, 20-year-old Wisconsin State champion with 2:37.7, and his time was just one-tenth of a second better than Potts'. Peterson made the long distance in 2:38.6.

Schroeder started with a spurt his partner, Leo Donovan of St. Paul, fell, but showed plenty of stamina and speed after the last turn.

Lamb, too, skated his heat alone, as his partner in the original drawings made under the European system of only two men in each heat, finished the long distance in 2:39.5 while in the 500 event he was timed at 46.9. Gunther Wedde of Detroit and John Bret, St. Louis, listed among top-notchers, could not make the grade.

CRAWFORD UPSETS PERRY FOR TITLE

Currently Rumored That Briton May Turn Professional—Bows In Four Sets To Australian.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) — MELB, RNE, Jan. 13.—Fred Perry of England, shown of the Australian singles tennis crown today had started a new wave of speculation concerning his prospects of turning professional either as a player or motion picture actor.

Showing unmistakable signs of tiring mentally and physically under the strain of his campaign and lacking control, the world champion Briton yesterday bowed in four sets to Jack Crawford, Australian Davis Cup star, 2-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4.

They played their match for the title Perry wrestled from Crawford last year, when he also won the Wimbledon championship and the United States crown, before a packed stadium of 10,000 spectators in furnace-like atmosphere. The heat did not retard the players—on the contrary it added to the fury of the competition after a slow first set.

"This may be the last time Crawford and I will meet," Perry said as he headed for the showers. Although he declined to amplify the remark, friends here accepted it as an indication that he had decided to turn professional, venturing forth either as a paid court player or as a movie performer.
