Vichy Terms Anglo-French Relations "Very Tense"

VICHY, May 29—(AP)—Vichy officials accused Britain tonight of continuing attacks on French colonial possessions, despite a formal protest, and the Vice-Premier, Admiral Jean Darlan, laid the responsibility for the war at London's door.

Vichy officials claimed the latest attack was made on a railroad station.

TANGIER, Spanish Morocco, May 29—(AP)—Gen. Maxime Weygand, commander of French troops in North Africa, tonight ordered anti-aircraft defenses strengthened throughout French North Africa after the British planes attacked an Italian destroyer and several merchant ships outside Tunisian harbor.

Hanson to Carry on as Party Leader

OTTAWA, May 29—(CP)—At the unanimous request of a party caucus, Hon. R. B. Hanson agreed today to carry on for another session of Parliament as a permanent host of acting Conservative Leader in the House of Commons, but the 62-year-old New Brunswick lawyer had no public comment on his decision.

Newspapermen were told simply by a spokesman at his office, "Mr. Hanson has nothing to say now. He feels that the caucus proceedings speak for themselves."

Mr. Hanson's endorsement came in circumstances similar to those surrounding his party's extension last July of the temporary leadership vested in him two months before, immediately after Hon. R. J. Manion resigned as national leader following his defeat at the polls.

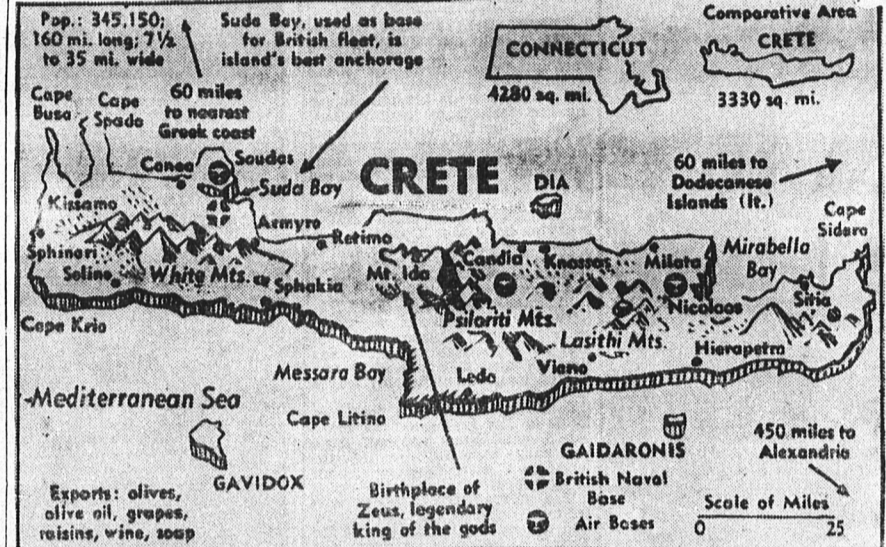
Tells of huge glider fleet over Greece

(By Daniel De Luce) (Associated Press Staff Writer) ANKARA, May 29—(AP)—The German air force towed a huge fleet of gliders across northern Greece a fortnight before opening the aerial invasion of Crete, it was reported today by a neutral merchant stranded in Salonika by the German occupation.

"I looked up from my front porch one morning and was dumfounded to see big transports towing apparently broken-down planes at an altitude of 12,000 feet," this source said. "Then I got my field glasses and discovered it was a glider convoy."

Each transport trailed a cable to which five gliders were attached. The gliders had long, slender fuselages with tremendous wings and possibly were able to carry from 10 to 20 men apiece.

Advance puts British 20 miles From Baghdad

Small Advance By Besieged Empire Forces At Tobruk.

CAIRO, May 29—(AP)—British troops advancing on Baghdad over roads flooded by broken irrigation ditches today captured the Iraq village of Khanu Ta, midway between Fallujah and the Iraq capital, a Royal Air Force communique announced.

Details of the engagement were not given. Earlier the British Middle East general headquarters said troops east of Fallujah captured one Iraq rebel officer and 92 other ranks.

A small advance was registered by Empire forces besieged for weeks at Tobruk, Libyan port, the Middle East general headquarters said.

Iraqi Claim

BAGHDAD, May 29—(AP)—More than 350 British Imperial troops were killed or wounded today in a fierce battle in western Iraq and in artillery bombardment of British positions in the Persian Gulf region, the Iraqi Government claimed tonight.

Eden outlines War aims of British Empire

Calls Germany Worst Master Europe Has Known; Must Not Be Permitted To Make War Again.

Yarbrough Associated Press Staff Writer) LONDON, May 29—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Eden today laid before the British Commonwealth, its allies and friends his first comprehensive statement of the nation's war aims and this resolution: "We must never forget that Germany is the worst master Europe has yet known."

Reports Heard British Landing Reinforcements

Suda Bay in German hands; Cruiser York destroyed; Fleet of 100 Nazi planes attacked in Western Crete.

NEW YORK, May 29—(AP)—The BBC in a French-language broadcast heard tonight by CBS said it had received a report that British reinforcements in men and material have arrived in Crete and "attacks are being answered with counter-attacks."

BBC said the report was contained in a Reuters dispatch from Cairo.

CAIRO, May 29—(AP)—The combination of 30,000 German troops and the air force dislodged the weary British and Greek forces from western Crete today and destroyed a third British cruiser in Suda Bay, now in German hands.

All the while, British bombers and long-range fighters, operating from the Egyptian mainland, were striking back at the German air fleet which now crowds the western end of Crete.

The air force also gave its version of yesterday's bombing of the Tunisian harbor of Sfax which the Vichy Government said it was protesting.

On the 10th day of their invasion, the German air-borne army, swollen by reinforcements, fought eastward from the shores of the bay, counter-attacked again and again by the retreating defenders.

The Axis-claimed—the capture of Suda Bay, the largest harbor and mid-way of the island's 160-mile northern coastal belt, and the arrival by sea of Italian troops in eastern Crete, claims which were not confirmed by Britain.

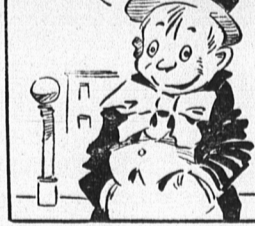
Soviets give Prominence to Roosevelt speech
