Urge Stiffer Penalties For Bribery

BOSTON, Jan. 28.—Stiffer penalties for bribing athletes than the proposed Massachusetts law calling for \$500 fine or one year's imprisonment were urged today by a spokesman for the Boston Bruins National Hockey League team.

Plead Innocent To Bribery Charges

(By The Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Harvey Stenner and Jerome Zarowitz, indicted on charges of attempted bribery and conspiracy to fix a professional football game, pleaded innocent at their arraignment today while the district attorney's office said gangsters, gamblers and fight managers had been questioned in a broadened investigation of an admitted \$100,000 boxing bribery attempt.

Stenner, an inmate of Rikers Island penitentiary, and Zarowitz, ex-convict who surrendered to district attorney Frank Hogan early today, appeared before general sessions Judge James G. Wallace.

Meanwhile David Krakauer, an ex-convict once accused of handling \$70,000 in bets in a day, was the object of a wide police search. Krakauer had been questioned last month in the investigation of the attempt by Alvin J. Paris to fix the Dec. 15 National Professional League title game between the New York Giants and Chicago Bears.

These developments came as designers of "Jacobs Beach," headquarters of the New York fixers, were rocked by the revelation that a \$100,000 bribe had been offered hard-punching Rocky Graziano to throw a fight to the investigation of attempted racketeering in sports was continuing on an all-out basis and one report circulated that police had obtained permission to tap telephones of more than 60 bookies, fight managers and gamblers.

Another report had it that numerous betting men, fight managers and small club promoters had left the city in the wake of Hogan's announcement.

Today's indictments were returned after Paris started "talking" about his alleged associates in offering bribes to two Giants' backfield stars, Frank Fichock and Merle Hapes.

The dapper Paris was to have been sentenced today on his conviction in the bribe case, but general sessions Judge Saul S. Streit set a new date of March 2 after Monaghan and the court: "I expect my defendant to be used as a witness for the people."

Will Not Be Attracted By Racing Prize

LONDON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—British racing circles said today that a United States turf emissary here to sell Britons on a \$100,000 world championship race would find few buyers among the Kingdom's thoroughbred owners.

The dream contest, being personally pushed by James Buttg, president of the Empire Racing Association of New York, was widely publicized upon his arrival but press comments were negative.

"The peers and business tycoons who own the big stables will not be attracted by the prize—more than double any British purse—they prefer to keep their horses over here," one source said.

"Our horses," wrote Bernard McEwaine in the News Chronicle, "running without long conditioning on tracks in the U.S.—where Buttg proposes the inaugural race to be run—would be at a tremendous advantage, like a ballerina in diving boots."

He pointed out that American tracks are standardized, left-handed, and dirt surfaced, while British courses are grass and undulating—"up hill and down dale."

Meanwhile, Buttg, not visibly discouraged, started a round of conferences with the turf fraternity. He planned to see Jockey Club officials and owners of prominent British horses. Tomorrow he is scheduled to go to Newmarket, capital of the vast British turf empire.
