A message to Joseph Salter's Sons of North Sydney on Tuesday stated that the schooner L'Etrole, which left North Sydney on Monday with a cargo of 76 tons of coal for 2000 lbs. P. E. I., was ashore at the entrance to Big Bras d'Or and will probably be a total loss. The vessel is owned by her master, Capt. Edward Walker, of Walkerville, C. B., and neither vessel nor cargo are insured.

The regular meeting of the Cheese Board was held in this city yesterday with a good attendance. The layers present were Messrs. Biffin, Spillet, Mutch, The Brockville message read: 3,500 cheese offered, 40 boxes sold at 12 1/2, 1-16 more offered by one buyer. Salesmen refused 12 1/2 on the curb. Following cheese were boarded: Kensington, 80; Stantley, 309; New Glasgow, 360; Hazelbrook, 192; Union, 110; St. Peter's, 81; Lakeville, 85; New Perth, 210; Red House, 90; Cornwall, 115; Red Point, 80; Hillaboro, 100; Winsloe, 80; East River, 57; Emerald, 250; New Dominion, 50.

Mr. E. H. Fisher, Red House and Lakeville at 12 1/2. R. E. Mutch secured Hazelbrook, New Glasgow, Union and East River at 12 3/16. Mr. Peters of the Dairy Department, Ottawa, was present at the Board meeting and cautioned the makers of cheese in boxing them to be careful that the cheese fitted the box exactly, as many cheese were too large for boxes and then went forward in a damaged condition. On the other hand, if the box was too large the weight came on box and damaged it. Cold storage is now supplied and these are going through in excellent condition. A committee of three—Messrs. Spillet, McDonald and Jenkins—was appointed to call on Supt. Sharp to find out the cause of the excessive charge made on empty cheese boxes.
