ANNUAL MEETING OF THE DAIRYMEN

Held Yesterday Afternoon in the B. I. S. Hall—Attendance Small Because of Frequent Postponements—Report of Inspector Morrow.

The annual meeting of the Provincial Dairy Association was held yesterday afternoon. Owing to frequent postponements the attendance was not so large as was to be expected.

Among those present were Vice President Laughlin McDonald, East Point; who occupied the chair in the absence of the President Arthur Simpson, Bay View; Secretary John Anderson, Kennington; Inspector Morrow, John R. Edwards, North Wilshire; Alfred Dewar, Royalty; James R. Monaghan, Hazelbrook; Artemas Moffatt, Mayfield; George Brown, New Glasgow; John A. Ferguson, Marshfield; Peter Dewar, Royalty; Harding Dewar, Royalty; John S. Cousins, Park Corner; James Arthur, Bastion; John A. McDonald, Orwell; Robert Jenkins, Mount Albion; John G. York; Hon. S. E. Reid, Commissioner of Agriculture; Secretary J. A. Ready.

Secretary John Anderson submitted his annual report which was an able and comprehensive review of the work of the past year.

The milk competition of last summer was discussed by a number of those present, some expressing objections to the present system which they thought was open to abuse.

It was agreed that each company furnish the Association with the number of cows in each district.

John S. Cousins emphasized the need of showing the best cows in the district, not the worst to the public, especially outside the province.

The annual report of Inspector F. E. Morrow as then submitted as follows.

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN,

In submitting my Report for the past season I will follow a plan similar to that of last year, and report on each factory separately, and in this way hope to bring out some point we were unable to reach before. A report of this kind has a certain sing song repetition, as nearly all the makers have the same object in view via.—to do the best they can, and as our system and results are uniform or nearly so as is possible considering the little difference of natural conditions and locality, I am afraid as I said before my report will sound a little humdrum. I have arranged the factories in alphabetical order, and therefore will start with Alberton, etc.

Alberton—made five visits, found the factory very well kept, surroundings clean and orderly, the whey tank well looked after, and the quality of milk received generally good except during the warm weather it was over-ripe. Cheese uniform in size and well made.

Belle River—made four visits. Factory tidy and clean, drainage and whey tank should receive more attention, milk considerably tainted by shore feed and water, otherwise cheese uniform and well made.

Carligan—made three visits. Factory tidy and clean, drainage and whey tank of account not being delivered daily, and as a consequence cheese were faulty in both texture and quality.

Campbellton—made four visits. General appearance inside fair, surroundings and drainage could be improved on by carrying the wash water away from the factory, and having a proper whey tank instead of as now having barrels sunk in the ground, which it is impossible to keep clean, quality of milk delivered fair, and the cheese well made, but not uniform in size.

Dundas—made six visits. Factory utensils clean and well kept, outside appearance and drainage good, tank kept clean, supply and quality of milk fair, cheese and butter well made.

East River—made five visits. Factory clean and tidy, drainage and tank well

looked after, milk supply effected by shore feed and water, the cheese well made, but showing somewhat of a marshy flavor.

Emerald—Made four visits. Factory not as tidy as I would like, tank and drainage require more attention, cheese very well made, but poorly finished, and not uniform in size.

Esquimaux Bay—Made three visits. Factory in good order, surroundings and drainage only fair, tank somewhat neglected, but milk supply improving in quality, and a decided improvement in the make of cheese.

Gowan Brae—Made four visits. Everything inside and out clean and tidy, the quality of milk delivered generally good, cheese uniform in size, well made and nicely finished.

Grand River—Made three visits. Factory and surroundings in good order, milk supply shows decided lack of care, being fatty and over-ripe, and impossible to make finest cheese.

Hazelbrook—Everything kept in good order. Milk delivered in good condition, cheese and butter well made.

St. Peter's Bay—Everything in good order, and condition. Cheese and butter well made and generally satisfactory throughout.

Hillsboro—Five visits made. Milk supply good, make room requires a new floor, as the old one leaking badly, tank should have more attention, cheese and butter well made.

Kinkora—Five visits. Factory and surroundings kept clean and tidy, milk supplied well cared for, cheese uniform exceptionally well finished and made.

Kennington—Five visits. Factory well kept, tank and drainage well looked after, quality of milk and cheese good.

Hamilton—Five visits. Factory and surroundings fair, quality of cheese decidedly improved towards end of season.

Lot 16—Five visits. The make room and curing room over-crowded, surroundings, tank and drainage good, quality of milk generally good, cheese well made, and also the butter, but the refrigerator held at too high a temperature.

Lakeville—Six visits. Everything in good order, cheese and butter well made, and very satisfactory.

M. H. North—Five visits. Everything clean and tidy, a portion of the milk supplied of poor quality, showing lack of interest in care, but cheese well made and neatly finished.

St. Stewart—Three visits. Factory and surroundings well attended to, milk often over-ripe, but the cheese well made.

Montague—Five visits. Everything clean and tidy around the factory, quality of milk fair, cheese and butter well made.

Morell—Four visits. Factory and surroundings well kept, tank somewhat neglected, milk over-ripe, and of course cheese cannot be as fine as if the milk were sweet; cheese were well made.

New Dominion—Four visits. Factory and surroundings well looked after, and tank kept clean, milk delivered rather over-ripe, and a considerable quantity marshy cheese, well made, but flavor off.

New Perth—Five visits. Everything in and around the factory in good order, cheese and butter well made, and of excellent flavor.

New Glasgow—Six visits. Factory well kept, but the whey tank is too close to the factory, necessitating more care than is often possible to give it, cheese well made, but considerably off flavor, due to lack of care of the milk.

Orwell—Six visits. Factory utensils, tank etc., carefully looked after and clean and tidy, considerable marshy milk, but the cheese and butter well made.

Osley—Four visits. Factory and surroundings clean and tidy, quality of milk delivered fair, and the cheese good.

Red Point—Five visits. Everything around and inside the factory, clean and tidy, decided improvement in flavor of milk delivered this past season, used to have considerable trouble with Island flavor which has practically disappeared.

Red House—Five visits. Also a decided improvement in this factory as regards flavor, and everything clean and in good working order.

St. Margarets—Four visits. Milk supply very small, but fair in quality, cheese well made and everything in good order.

Stanley Bridge—Five visits. Factory kept clean and tidy, but tank is too near factory, and kept covered up too closely; cheese well made and nicely finished, but somewhat faulty in flavor.

Souris—Four visits. Factory and surroundings kept clean and tidy, quality of milk and cheese good.

Tignish—Five visits. Factory rather over-crowded, otherwise everything in good order, quality of milk fair, cheese well made.

Tyne Valley—Four visits. Factory utensils and surroundings well looked after, excepting the whey tank being somewhat neglected, considerable of the milk over-ripe, but the cheese, well made.

V. R. Bridge—Five visits. Factory neat and clean, drainage good, tank not as well looked after as should be, some marshy milk, but cheese nicely finished, and well made.

Winsloe—Three visits. Everything satisfactory and the cheese well made.

Freestone—One visit. Everything going nicely, but the drainage should be improved on.

Crapaud—Six visits. Factory fairly well kept, drainage good, but requires new milk spouts, quality of milk and butter good.

Bonshaw Skimming Station—One visit. Requires new floor, but natural drainage good.

Cherry Valley—Six visits. Everything clean and tidy, and the quality of butter was good.

Beleque—Six visits. Everything in good order, excepting the drainage, which is only fair, quality of butter good.

Cornwall—Five visits. Everything well kept and in good order, cheese and butter well made.

Dunstaffnage—Eight visits. Factory and surroundings clean and tidy and drainage good. The care of some of the milk might be easily improved on, but the butter was good.

Eton—Five visits. Everything in and around the factory clean, considerable marshy milk, but butter well made.

Hampton—Six visits. Drainage only fair, tank clean, quality of milk not clean in flavor, but the butter well made.

Lot 40—Three visits. Drainage and tank well looked after, but the quality of milk only fair, butter well made but on account of no refrigerator it was impossible to keep it right during the hot weather.

Lake Verde—Seven visits. Everything in and around the building in good order, and the butter rather fancy in quality.

Yennings' creamery—Four visits. Everything here also in good condition, and the butter good.

Tryon—Six visits. Factory clean and well kept, as is also the drainage and tank and in its supply good, butter well made.

Lauchling—Five visits. Factory well kept, and drainage good, milk and butter also good.

Co-Operative—Five visits. Everything in and around the factory in good order, and butter well made.

Park Corner—Six visits. Factory and surroundings well kept, quality of milk generally good, and butter and cheese well made.

You will notice that the factories generally are kept in good order as to cleanliness, etc., and of course when a maker is naturally inclined to be clean it is a pleasure to visit his factory, for he not only keeps a clean factory, but has his patrons supply of milk of a better quality, and in clean cans, which is the most important part of our business, and right here I want to call your attention to the fact that each year we are expected to do better work to keep in pace with the requirements of the markets, and in order to do so I hope to see every Cheese and Butter maker take his place on the weight stand, clean and neat, and instruct his patrons how to take care of the milk, and when it is delivered in poor condition, have back-bone enough to return it, for the quality of cheese and butter will never be any better than the milk it is made from.

The boxing and shipping of cheese and butter, the invoicing, etc., in some cases, also needs attention.

The drainage, too, is another important thing, and in a few cases could profitably be improved.

The surroundings of our factories could be made more attractive generally by the planting of trees, keeping the fences repaired, and the buildings painted or white-washed, thus causing a more pleasing effect to passers-by. We should, in fact, take more pride in the appearance of our factories than we have done in the past. A little time each year could be advantageously spent planting a few trees, and looking after the outside appearance of the buildings.

Trusting I have made things as plain as necessary and that I have not wearied you, I beg to thank you for your hearty co-operation in the past, and look for a more prosperous and profitable season for 1905.

Complimentary remarks on the report were made by John Ferguson, who spoke on the advantages of corn, John R. Ed

wards, who emphasized the need of discarding old cans, and Secretary Anderson who gave the Inspector credit for the good condition of the factories now prevailing.

The report was adopted after further remarks by the presiding officer. Hon. Mr. Reid, Commissioner of Agriculture, expressed his pleasure at being present and spoke of the Creameries at Tryon and Crapaud. Every encouragement should be given to our farming population to stay in the dairy business. He advised that more attention be given to green crops for use in time of drought.

Prof. Ready after expressing his pleasure at being present, read an excellent paper on Some Essentials to Success in the Dairy Industry.

Secretary Anderson complimented Mr. Ready upon his paper which was a very practical one.

R. E. Spillett in a prepared paper, read by the Secretary, said the quality of cheese here was as good as any, if not a little better than any other in Canada. He advised co-operation with a capable head to overcome the lack of interest which would probably be the result of last year's poor crops.

Alfred Dewar spoke briefly of the paper preceding.

The election of directors resulted as follows: Queen's—Arthur Simpson, Bay View; James H. Monaghan, Hazelbrook; J. R. Edwards, North Wilshire.

Prince—Rev. J. McDonald, Lot 16; John Anderson, Kennington.

King's—Lauchlin McDonald, East Point; Alexander Hamilton, New Perth.

Auditor—A. E. Dewar.

Assessment was fixed at a sum sufficient, not to exceed \$300.

A number of speakers expressed themselves in favor of continuance of prizes for most milk produced.

A committee composed of W. H. Gill, John S. Cousins and Laughlin McDonald, was appointed to wait on the Government for an increased grant.

The publication committee reported and the report was adopted.

The question of prizes for milk was further discussed at some length and it was agreed to leave the matter as last year.

Notes of thanks were tendered to the returning auditors for their gratuitous work and to Professor Ready and Mr. Spillett for their papers after which the meeting closed shortly after six o'clock.
