for defendant.  
Arthur Wright vs. T. C. Craig, Captain  
of the City of London. Action for alleged  
claim in an over-charge in collecting  
on freight in a wagon and also for wharf-  
age collected by captain, it being con-  
tended that the Steam Navigation Com-  
pany only had the right of collecting  
wharfage. Stewart E. C. for plaintiff,  
Bassard, K. C. for defendant.  
Benj. Mohr vs. Jas. Lund and  
others. An action for \$34 wages. The ce-  
lence was that the payment was ac-  
cording to the catch made. A. J. B. Meilish  
for plaintiff, Stewart E. C. for defendant.  
In all of these cases as in several other  
minor ones, judgment was reserved.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL  
CONVENTIONS**

Held at Murray Harbor North  
and Orwell Head.

Schools Report Progress—Helpful  
Addresses Given by the Field  
Secretary and George  
Irving.

The South Kings District S. S. Con-  
vention was held at Murray Harbor North on  
Thursday, August 18th inst. Six schools  
sent delegates to the meeting. At the af-  
ternoon session W. B. Beers presided and  
conducted the devotional exercises.  
Reports of progress received from a num-  
ber of schools. G. R. Montgomerie report-  
ed on behalf of the Finance Committee  
appointed at the last Convention. Each  
school needs to put forth more effort if  
the amount expected from the District is  
to be raised.

The Field Secretary gave a blackboard  
lesson on "A teaching method," showing  
the teachers how to prepare the minds of  
the scholars for the lesson, and how to  
present the actual lesson facts. Then he  
showed how to lead the scholars to draw  
the truth from these facts and how to  
apply the truth in their every day life.  
He then briefly taught a S. S. lesson in ac-  
cordance with the principles laid down. A  
short discussion followed bringing out  
some of the needs of day in S. S. work.  
At the evening session the Field Secre-  
tary conducted the devotional exercises.  
The President read a short address of  
welcome to the delegates which was re-  
sponded to by the Field Secretary. One  
or two of the evening speakers were un-  
avoidably absent. The Field Secretary  
gave a helpful address on "The Child for  
Christ." He showed the need of tea-  
chers and parents studying the child, study-  
ing his nature, his needs and his interests.  
Then he showed briefly how to study the  
child's nature and how to suit the training  
to his needs so that he may be held for  
Christ from his early days.

The thanks of the convention were  
tendered to the congregation, to the  
choir and to the homes for their hospi-  
tality and kindness.

The tenth convocation of the Eldon Dis-  
trict S. S. Association was held in the  
Frederick Church, Orwell Head on  
Friday, 19th inst.  
The afternoon session opened with de-  
votional exercises led by Rev. Mr. Archi-  
bald, Field Secretary.  
The President then took the chair and  
minutes of last meeting were read and  
approved.  
The recall was responded to by de-  
legates from the following schools:—  
Newton, Ujig, Cherry Valley, Vernon  
River, South, Orwell, Belle Riv-  
er, Edon, Grandview, Lyndae and  
Vernon River North.

Albert McLeod read an excellent  
paper on "The Teacher as a character  
builder." Of all the qualifications of a  
S. S. teacher, he considered a devoted  
Christian life the fundamental one.  
Rev. Mr. Archibald gave a blackboard  
lesson on "A Method of teaching." The  
first step, he said, should be to prepare  
the minds of the pupils by clearing  
them of all ideas not relating to the  
subject on which they are to be taught.  
The next step should be to present the lesson either  
in story form or have the pupils, if old  
enough, read it. When a transition from  
the lesson to its application to every day  
life has been made the golden text which  
contains the truth of the lesson should be  
called for and impressed upon the minds  
of the pupils.

In the evening George Irving gave an  
earnest talk on Prayer which was  
offered in the Spirit of Jesus Christ, he  
regarded as the greatest force in all the  
universes.  
The Field Sec'y took as his subject  
"The Child for Christ." He showed how  
necessary it is to study the child in order  
to supply his needs.  
The place of next meeting is to be  
decided by executive. Of the amount  
which the Eldon District undertook to  
raise thirty dollars have been paid. It is  
hoped that the schools which have not  
yet responded will do so as soon as  
possible.
