Cadet Inspection

The two Cadet Corps of the city West Kent and Queen Square Schools were inspected yesterday morning at Victoria Park by Captain H. M. Logan, District Cadet Officer, R. C. R., Halifax.

After the ceremonial and march past the boys were put through Company Drill, Platoon Drill, Extended Order and Physical Training. After the inspection Captain Logan, who was on his first visit to Charlottetown, said he was particularly pleased with the inspection which was very creditable to the schools and to the District as well. If the benefits of Cadet training were not felt now they would be later on. He made special reference to the power of leadership shown by a 13 year old boy, Alfred Doucette, one of the platoon leaders of Queen Square School Corps. The fact that the boys did not give vent to their pent up energy in shouting as would seem quite natural during physical training showed the splendid controllable effects of discipline. The two instructors, L. J. MacDonald of Queen Square and Captain Vernon McLeod of West Kent also the Company Leaders Captain Bruce Pigot of Queen Square and Capt. Nelson Rattenbury of West Kent. Captain Logan arrived on the island on Monday night and in the meantime has inspected the Cadet Corps at Summerside, Souris and Georgetown. He leaves on return to Halifax and will return before the Camp breaks up.

ROUSING CONVENTION

FURTHER RESOLVED: That we convey to our popular leader, Jas. D. Stewart Esq., K. C., our high appreciation of the splendid services he has already given to his party and the people services which are an earnest of what we can with confidence expect when after the 26th of July he assumes the honourable position of Premier of our Province. We approve his good judgment in deciding to repeal that unfair poll tax and of reducing the sessional indemnity. His platform and general policy as announced at this convention we believe is the one best adapted to meet the requirements of the country and which will conduce most to the prosperity of our people and we here assure him of a liberal support in his contest for clean, sane and honest government.

THE LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE PLATFORM

FINANCIAL

A thorough revision of the system of accounting and the presentation of the Public Accounts in such a manner as to exhibit the true condition of the finances of the Province in a plain and intelligible manner.

The abolition of the Poll Tax.

Reduction of the cost of administration of the Departments of the Public Service to the lowest point, consonant with thorough efficiency.

Reduction in sessional indemnities of Members of the Legislature.

A real effort to press our claims against the Dominion, more especially the claim for increased compensation for want of Public Lands, and upon success in this to further reduce taxation.

A further extension to Returned Soldiers of the privilege of freedom from taxation.

No further increase in the Public Debt of the Province, unless for borrowing for absolutely necessary permanent Public Works.

EDUCATION

A thorough investigation into our educational system with a view to remedying the conditions which result in such a large percentage of failures among Prince of Wales College Students, and to raising and standardizing the work of our Common Schools.

A return to the policy of lowering the cost of school books and school supplies to the people through the School Supply Department.

To provide a more complete and thorough normal training for candidates for teachers' licenses.

Revival of Summer Schools for teachers and other means to encourage and assist them.

AGRICULTURE

(At present this Province is not getting value for the Public Money expended in this Department.)

Revising and expanding the policy of furnishing Mussel Mud Fertilizer to our Farmers.

Encouraging co-operation in the production, manufacture and marketing of dairy and other farm products with a view to raising and standardizing quality; and generally, assistance and protection to co-operation.

Continued assistance and encouragement to School Fairs, Women's Institutes, Exhibitions and like Institutions.

A strong and insistent attempt and co-operation with the other Maritime Provinces to reduce transportation rates, especially on farm products.

Assistance to and co-operation with farmer's Institutions in finding and developing markets for farm products.

In view of the importance of the Seed Potato Industry to the Province to assist in procuring fertilizer at the lowest possible prices, including freight rates, and in providing transportation facilities for export.

PUBLIC WORKS

A return to the Road Act of 1912 revised and adapted to suit present conditions and consequent abolition of the present large body of Road Inspectors.

Expenditure of the Highway Moneys:—

(A) So as to make for permanent work.

(B) So as to eliminate waste upon section of roads where large expenditures are not required.

(C) So that the greatest possible amount of the money expended reach the wage earners.

Greater attention to repair and up-keep of ordinary Roads and Bridges.
