

The Late Mr. George A. Stewart

The death occurred in this city Friday evening of Mr. George A. Stewart in the 80th year of his age.

He was born at Lot 48 the son of the late Charles Stewart.

After carrying on farming at Brudenell he removed to Charlottetown thirty-eight years ago where he took a position with Auld Bruce, and later with the firm of Bruce, Stewart and Company, remaining with them until he retired in January 1930 owing to advancing years and failing health.

Mr. Stewart was able to be up and around until Monday last when he was taken to his bed and since then gradually grew weaker until the end came.

He was a man of splendid character and made many warm friends in city and country.

There are left to mourn one son, Charles D. of Charlottetown and one daughter, Mrs. Letith Wright, at whose home he passed away.

Surviving him are three sisters, Mrs. Major Linkletter, Mrs. Archibald Linkletter, and Miss Annie Stewart, all residing at Linkletter in Prince County.

He was a brother of the late Mr. Bruce Stewart of this city.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Letith Wright to the People's Cemetery. The services at the house and at the grave were conducted by Rev. W. L. Outhouse, pastor of the Central Christian Church, of which Mr. Stewart was a faithful member, and Rev. M. E. Genge. The pall bearers were Messrs. C. H. Chandler, C. F. MacKay, J. H. Williams, W. L. Smith, Thomas White, Jr., and Peter Dewar.

The funeral was very largely attended.

Re-enacts Fire At Reichstag

By Louis P. Lochner, Associated Press Staff Writer. BERLIN, Oct. 13. (AP)—The tenacious insistence of Marinus Van Der Lubbe, the Dutch brickmason, that he alone set the fire at the Reichstag and had no accomplices, was substantiated tonight to the satisfaction of the Supreme Court in a spectacular session at the scene of the conflagration.

As torches glared fitfully in the darkened Reichstag in a reconstruction of the circumstances surrounding the mysterious blaze, a witness whose testimony last Tuesday was the cause of tonight's rehearsal completely backed down on his former story, in which he said he saw two persons enter the building on the night of the fire.

The witness was Werner Thaler, a typesetter, whose testimony contradicted that of others who appeared before the Court. He said he saw two lighted torches being carried through the building, about a yard apart. Tonight he said:

Makes Denial "I never said I had seen two persons there simultaneously."

He declared instead he might have seen the same man twice.

Judge Buenger, presiding over the trial, held that this was plausible, explaining that Van Der Lubbe, bending and raising again behind the ledge of the balcony, might have given the impression there were two persons present.

He also commented that the glare of the fire brands seen through the frosted glass of basement windows might appear like two, giving the impression that two incendiaries were at work.

The reconstruction of the famous fire for which five alleged communists are on trial, began at 8 o'clock, with the Supreme Court judges, defendants and other familiar personalities huddled outside the Reichstag in the Autumn darkness.

Thousands of spectators watched the drama from police lines drawn at a distance from the Parliament building, while the immediate vicinity of the Reichstag was sown with patrols of armed police.

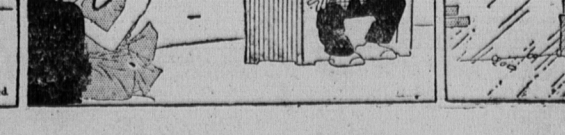
