### FRENCH MINISTRY GLAD TO GET OUT

PARIS, Feb. 25—Premier Briand and the members of the cabinet will resign on Monday. They reported this decision at a conference in the premier's office when the political situation was thoroughly canvassed from beginning to end. The large majority of sixteen, which the government received last night in a vote of confidence in the chamber of deputies on the premier's arraignment by the radical socialists, Louis Malvy and Paul Meunier, was a sore blow to the premier and his associates, who had been sustained many times in previous crises by much larger votes. In the end, M. Briand declared that

he was "sick of it all." The only reason for waiting until Monday to present their signatures to the president is that members wish to show their respect for the memory of their late colleague, General Brun, whose funeral will take place Monday morning. There is much uncertainty tonight as to what will happen, whether counsel will be taken of the parliamentary groups, will ask Briand to stay in power or whom he will invite to form a new ministry. Leon Bourgeois, former premier and ex-minister of foreign affairs; Raymond Poincaré, ex-minister of finance; Theophile Delcasse, ex-foreign minister, are among the names mentioned, although it is understood that M. Delcasse is personally not liked by the president of the republic. The decision of the ministry to withdraw has created an enormous political sensation. The conservative

newspapers are sounding a note of alarm. The declare that the forces of extreme radicalism are triumphing over sane and progressive reform, regarding the clerical issue, which was raised yesterday as a mere pretext to attain Briand's downfall. They point out that it is ridiculous to accuse the man who constructed the separation law of clericalism, and now that the church and state are completely divorced, M. Briand has been merely following out a general program of "appeasement."

The vote in the chamber of deputies, therefore, is interpreted as the result of an intrigue among Briand's adversaries in his own party, who have been plotting his overthrow since the great crisis in the railway strike and blocking the premier's program of arbitration in labor disputes in connection with the public service corporations. Physically and mentally exhausted by several years of uninterrupted labors in official life, M. Briand is sincerely anxious to retire. Even now he is discussing with his friends the delights of a proposed trip to the Mediterranean. It is understood that H. Pichou, minister of foreign affairs, is equally determined to withdraw and would not accept a place in the new cabinet if it were offered to him. The Temps, in summing up the situation, blames parliament for taking too much interest in the railway employees, who imperilled the security of the country, and not enough in the issues designed to protect the nation from civil war.

"M. Briand," says the Temps, "has the support of public opinion. His departure gives all Frenchmen food for grave reflection, for France is menaced by moral disorder and a conscienceless parliament."

### HERMIT OF THE DISMAL SWAMPS IS DEAD.

SUFFOLK, Va., Feb. 25—Fletcher Lassiter, "Hermit of the Dismal Swamps," is dead here. Most of his sixty years were passed around Lake Drummond. The unexplored jungles were to him like Broadway to a New Yorker, and the wild beasts were his companions. Against the "hermit's" violent protests he was carried to the home of a relative in Nansemond County to die.

A ways a lover of the lake, Lassiter, after he obtained a divorce many years ago, procured a bungalow by the lakeside and became a recluse. He never left the swamps except on rare occasions to procure simple rations. Game and fish were his principal foods. Occasionally the "hermit" would hold conversations with sportsmen, but only from a distance.

### WANT REAL TEST OF RECIPROCITY

WASHINGTON, D. C. Feb. 27.—President Taft made it plain tonight that he will not be deterred from his determination to call an extra session of Congress to secure action on the Canadian reciprocity agreement by any vote which the senate may take on the question, unless it is plain to him that such a vote is a real test on the merits of the agreement and not merely an attempt to avoid an extra session.

Intimations were made today that the president might be kept from convening congress in extra session if some sort of a vote could be secured, whether direct or not, tending to show strong opposition to the measure. Efforts were made it was said, to secure the votes of a number of members who were in favor of reciprocity, but opposed to an extra session, the intimation being that the president would be satisfied with a test vote which showed that the opposition against reciprocity would not be overcome, even in an extra session.

The president declared emphatically tonight that nothing would satisfy him but an absolutely honest vote on the merits of the bill.

This was after the conference at the White House at which Representatives Payne, Dalzell, Dwight, Weeks and Gillett were present. The president also had summoned a number of senators, but owing to the night session they could not go and will see the president tomorrow.

The subject discussed at the conference was the date for the meeting of the extra session. The date now rests practically with the Republican leaders and the president will wait until he has heard from them before fixing the time definitely for the convening of congress, should it be necessary.

His original intention, he explained to them, had been to call it without delay. Then in deference to the wishes of the Democratic leaders, Clark and Underwood, who desired him to give him six weeks respite, he had suggested a compromise date, April 4, tentatively. Not wanting it understood, however, that this date had been definitely fixed, he summoned the Republican leaders to get their views as to the time which they thought best for the reconvening.

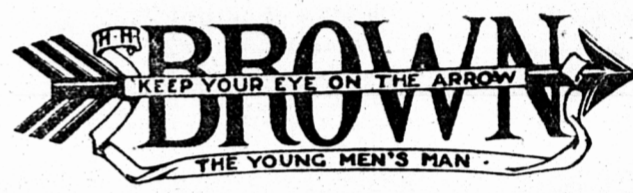

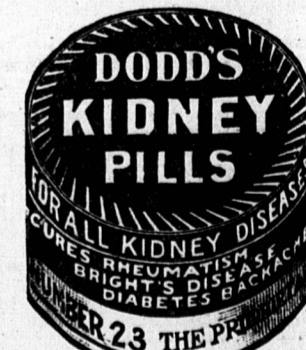
