CATTLE SHIPPED—Thirty head of Holstein fresh cow cattle were shipped yesterday to the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst. These are from the herd of J. Walter Jones, Bunbury Farm and many of them were champions at former shows. At last year's Royal Show at Toronto the Bunbury senior graded herd took first prize and Mr. Jones states this year's herd is better than that of 1927. The herd champion bull Abegweit Flyer, not to be in the line-up at Amherst, because of a ruling peculiar to Nova Scotia fairs which does not permit jointly owned bulls to be shown. Mr. Jones sold a half breeding interest in this animal last April for \$2,500. It is expected that the Island Holstein chief competitor will be M. L. McCarthy's herd of Sussex. N. B. McCarthy's herd has been the leading winner at seven exhibitions this year. The clash of these two great herds next Tuesday will be awaited with more than usual interest. Mr. McCarthy who is a Boston broker is said to have spent \$100,000 in establishing his herd. Among other competitors from this province are: Harold Stead, 15 Jerseys; A. MacRae, Central Royalty, 22 ayrshires; Alex MacKay, East Royalty, carriage horses and ponies; Estate of E. Saunders, herefords; Horne Bros., Winsloe, polled Angus and horses.

ment of the disposal of the Labrador or of a change in the Constitution of the country. Therefore the Premier said that no suggestion was made at the conference for the Labrador boundary in Montreal two years ago, that Quebec or Canada should by Labrador boundary was participated in by the Dominion of Canada, Newfoundland and the Province of Quebec. No agreement was reached at it and it was decided to submit the whole question to the Privy Council. This was done last year and the Privy Council in its award ruling in favor of Newfoundland's claim, setting the boundary at the height of land, which gave Newfoundland large tracts of forest lands and many waterpower sites, including the great Grand Falls cataracts and waterfall.

PREMIER TASCHEREAU'S COMMENT

QUEBEC, Nov. 2.—The purchase of Labrador would be a question for Ottawa first of all rather than Quebec, Premier the Hon. L. A. Taschereau, said today in commenting on the statement of Sir William Coaker, following the Squires victory in Monday's election under the Alderidge government in Newfoundland that one result of the election in his opinion would be the "sale of Labrador either to an American syndicate or Canada."
