PURITY OF FOODS.

The Food Department of the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station has been issuing special bulletins with regard to purity of food, etc. No. 23 of December, 1915, has to do with the value of foods. The first paragraph is headed "What are the facts?" A short time ago in one of their bulletins attention was called to the fact that wheat bought at a maximum price of \$1.80 per bushel was being retailed as a cereal food in package form at the rate of \$27 per bushel. After the distribution of this bulletin a circular was sent out trying to throw discredit on the Food Commissioner and to show that the firm was entitled to a very large amount for the work in connection with the food. Does it cost 1500 per cent to transform a bushel of wheat into food product as inflated? It then goes on to give information regarding the various cereal foods that are now being offered on the market. It is a most valuable bulletin for the housewife at the time when the question of the high cost of living is so prominently before the public. Nearly every grocer carries a large supply of these cereal foods in packages, some of them are reasonably priced, others are very expensive, and it is well that the consumer should have accurate information regarding the food value that is being obtained for the money that is spent. There is no doubt but that any one interested can secure copies of this bulletin from the Agricultural Experiment Station, Agricultural College, North Dakota, U. S. A.

Dear Fenton:

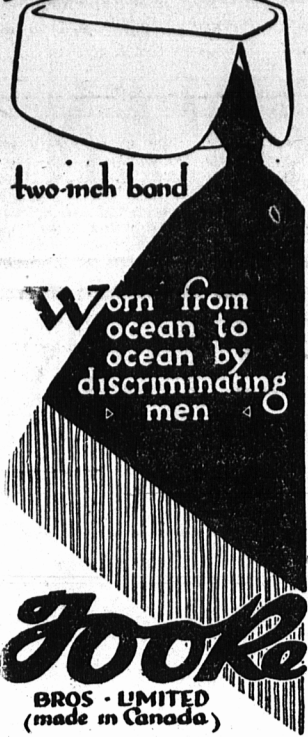

PEKING, Jan. 2.—Yuan Shi Kai, president of China, who has accepted the proffer of an Emperor's crown upon the part of various elements in the nation, entered the palace in the Imperial Yellow Chair sat on the Throne and was announced as "His Imperial Majesty" at the New Year's Day reception given for Chinese officials. He is already addressed as Emperor of the Chinese, although the formal coronation ceremony has not taken place.

WHAT CANADA PAYS!

SOLDIERS PAY AND ALLOWANCES, CONDITIONS OF ENLISTMENT PROVISION FOR WIVES, MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Canada is determined that her sons shall be as well paid and their families as well cared for, as a grateful and wealthy country can afford. The scale of pay for Overseas Service, the allowances from the Patriotic Fund, and the Pensions, are on a more liberal basis than those of any other country engaged in the war.

SCALE OF PAY

Table with columns: RANK, Pay per day, Allowance per day, Separation Allowance per month. Rows include Sergeants, Corporals, Privates, Buglers, Drummers etc.

The man arc, of course, fed and clothed by the Government. The Separation Allowance is the sum paid by the Government to the wife of each enlisted man, or to the widowed mother if the son is unmarried and is her sole support. This is in addition to part of his pay which is reserved for her.

One-half of a soldier's pay is withheld by the Government and paid to his dependents. This ensures that at least \$35.00 per month is paid by the Government to the wife of each soldier.

THE PATROTIC FUND

The Patriotic Fund has been created to assist those dependents of a soldier who need more help than the Government gives. From this Fund the following sums are paid if the need exists:—

Table showing amounts for Wives, Children of widowers, Mothers of unmarried men, Children of married men according to age and number in family.

Ladies representing the Patriotic Fund pay regular visits to families of men on Overseas Service, and give friendly advice and practical help in case of need. Many employers have pledged themselves to give preference to returned soldiers when engaging men.

PENSIONS

The Canadian scale of pensions range for private soldier, from \$75.00 per year for certain minor injuries to \$264.00 for total disability. In case of death \$22.00 a month is paid to the widow, and \$5.00 a month for each child. A widowed mother whose son was her whole support receives \$22.00 a month.

British Industries Fair

In view of the great success of the British Industries Fair, held at the Agricultural Hall, London, England, from May 10th to 21st, 1914, the Imperial Board of Trade have decided to hold the second British Industries Fair at the Trades Exhibition Building, Kensington, London, on February 21st, 1916. The Fair will be open for twelve days. The Fair will be conducted on the same lines as that of 1915, and is intended to extend to British Manufacturers the same advantages as have been derived by Continental Manufacturers from the Trade Fairs held in their respective countries. Buyers from the United Kingdom and from all parts of the world are invited to the Fair, and, as it is intended for the Trade only (the general public not being admitted), buyers will have an exceptional opportunity of transacting their business in a minimum of time. Manufacturers only will be allowed to exhibit, and their exhibits will be strictly confined to goods of their own make. The Trades exhibiting will be: Toys, glassware, fancy goods, earthenware and china, printing, stationery. Admission to the Fair will be by invitation of His Majesty's Board of Trade only, and will be restricted to bona fide buyers for United Kingdom and Overseas Markets. Buyers from the Dominion of Canada visiting the United Kingdom during the course of the Fair, i.e., February 21st to March 4th, and interested in the above-mentioned trades, should not fail to communicate immediately on arrival in the United Kingdom with—The Director, British Industries Fair, 32 Chancery Lane, London, E.C.2.
