## Saints and P. W. C. In Rugby Game Today

The second game of the island Intermediate Intercollegiate Rugby series between Prince of Wales College and Saint Dunstan's University which was postponed on account of rain on Wednesday, will get underway at the S.L.U. gridiron this afternoon at 3:45.

## Coaltown And Capot To Battle It Out Today

BALTIMORE, Oct. 27 (AP)—The two big "C's" of racing, Coaltown and Capot, hook up tomorrow in the Pimlico Special, with no holds barred and no love lost between two of the biggest stables in the United States.

This mile-and-three-sixteenths classic has simmered down to virtually a match race between four-year-old Coaltown, the pride of Calumet Farm, and Greentree Stable's three-year-old star, Capot. A dozen or so other nags were invited to the Special, but none cared to come along.

The feud and fightin' between Calumet and Greentree began in this year's Kentucky Derby—won by Calumet's Pender as Capot ran second—and it's been going on since.

The fact that the entire \$15,000 pot tomorrow goes to the winner, with the loser getting only the exercise, means nothing to the two powerful horse establishments. They are the top money-winning stables of 1949, Calumet with \$1,248,422 and Greentree with \$556,812.

## Fight Managers Hound Woodcock For Title Go

LONDON, Oct. 27 (CP)—Bruce Woodcock, Empire heavyweight boxing champion, doesn't want to accept any challenges for his crown until after his "world title" bout against the Savoie here next spring. But Harry Levene, first-breathing fight manager, refuses to take no for an answer.

Levene has posted two challenges to Woodcock's throne on behalf of two Toronto Negro fighters—Earl Walls, 21-year-old fighter of Cherokee blood, and Verne Escote, national champion with plenty of experience in United States rings.

Levene has offered a £1,000 (\$3,100) even-money wager on behalf of Escote and a £1,000-£500 bet to back Walls.

Woodcock and his manager, Tom Hurst, just aren't interested. With an eye on bigger money they say the Empire heavyweight champ will not fight until the Savoie contest—then he shall be prepared to receive offers.

That sort of talk makes Levene hopping mad.

He says "It doesn't matter whether Hurst and Woodcock are interested or not.

"I will force Woodcock to meet one of my boys, or I will ask the British Boxing Board of Control to void his title. The rules only allow a champion six months' between title defenses. He has had four months now since he beat Freddy Mills. He's got to quit making excuses and fight or lose the title."

Woodcock, a European title was voided on similar grounds.

## Maple Leafs Shut Out Montreal Canadiens 2-0

MONTREAL, Oct. 27 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs broke up what threatened to be a scoreless tie tonight by snatching a 2-0 victory over Montreal Canadiens before a crowd of 12,340 at the Forum.

The victory sent the Leafs up to within one point of the league-leading Canadiens who, by the time the game ended, were in danger of being overtaken by Detroit Red Wings for top place in the National Hockey League.

For more than 58 minutes big Bill Durnan in the Montreal net held up the whole Canadian team.

The Leafs were on the prowl early and they gave the Montreal ers no rest. The Torontoians controlled the puck almost throughout, far outshot Canadiens and checked them so relentlessly the home team could seldom get an attack organized.

The break came at 18:13 of the last period just after Ken Mowbray of Canadiens drew a major penalty for high-sticking Bill Juzza and drawing blood.

Sid Smith and Ken Reardon scrapped for the puck well inside the Montreal blue-line. Fleming Mackell swooped in and drove the puck past Durnan on a close-in shot.

Bill Shorthand, Canadiens pulled Durnan from the nets in a last desperate effort. Suddenly Harry Watson got the puck inside his defence area, skated over the blue line and sent a long shot into the empty Montreal cage.

The Leafs missed many great chances earlier, particularly Cal Gardiner and Watson who missed open nets when Durnan was flat on the ice. Canadiens were able to give Broda few close calls.
