POLICE ACCUSED OF CAUSING DEATH OF DETROIT CHILD

(Canadian Press) DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 20.—A riot call was sent by police tonight when a mob estimated at 5,000 persons attempted to gain entrance to the home of John Lorne, to view the body of his thirteen year old daughter, Gladyslava, who the father alleges, died from ill-treatment at the hands of police after her arrest Sept. 11 on a charge of larceny.

According to a statement issued by James Sprout assistant superintendent of the police, the girl was sent to the juvenile detention home immediately after her arrest and the next day removed to a hospital. The statement says death was caused by acute pleurisy.

"The plan is practically one of conversion, inasmuch as it is the intention of the syndicate to offer the bonds at once on terms which, it is believed, will be deemed favorable to the holders of the Dominion bonds which fall due Nov. 1.

BRITISH REPLY TO U. S. IS NOT SYMPATHETIC

Ruhr Enjoys Peace

(Canadian Press) BERLIN, Sept. 20.—Since the government formerly announced its inability to further finance passive resistance in the Ruhr and the Rhineland there has been a marked cooling of ardor in the ranks of the resisters.

One of the immediate effects of the withdrawal of official creditors to the industrialists, employes and labor organizations is reflected in the growing inclination on the part of many of the workers to return to their former posts.

NEW RESOLUTION REPLACES THE CANADIAN AMENDMENT

Re Interpretation of Article Ten of Covenant—First Clause Demands Consideration of Geographical Situation When Military Measures Are Necessary.

(Canadian Press) GENEVA, Sept. 20.—An important feature of today's League activities was the adoption by a commission of a resolution interpreting Article X of the covenant. The commission adopted a new compromise formula replacing the Canadian amendment. It begins by emphasizing the existence of a general desire for precision of meaning of Article X and accepts several clauses in the form of a resolution.
