Oblate Fathers Plan Relief for Missions

CHURCHILL Man, Feb 5—(CP)—Rev. R. Ferron, procurator of the Vicariate of Hudson's Bay, said last night funds are being raised to finance relief expeditions in April to mission posts at Repulse Bay, Pelly Bay and Igloo Lik, deep in the Arctic Circle.

Father Ferron said the Oblate Fathers hope to buy their own plane to fly "essentials" such as matches, ammunition and medical supplies to Repulse Bay, about 700 miles north of Churchill, Pelly Bay and Igloo Lik, supplied through Repulse Bay are some 150 miles farther north.

The mission boat M. F. Therese, a 205-ton semi-ice breaker, was sunk in Hudson Strait in 1944. It was hoped the Hudson's Bay Company boat Fort Severen would be able to take annual supplies to Repulse Bay this year, but the trip could not be made because of ice.

Father Ferron said the priests in the remote outposts—Father S. Bazin, Peter Henry, Theophilus Didier, Julien Cochard and Frank Vandeveldt—face extreme hardship because of the lack of supplies.

He added that plans of the Vicariate to purchase two airplanes, but efforts now are being made to institute air communication among remote Arctic posts. It was hoped two planes might be obtained by next summer.

A school which trains priests to fly already is in operation at Belleville, Ill.

ADD HORTICULTURAL LEAD TO COME

OTTAWA, Feb. 5—(CP)—An import system to curtail imports of fresh fruits and vegetables into Canada to a volume sufficient to meet the actual needs of Canadian Horticultural Council.

The suggestion was made by the Council's Legislation Committee in a report to the opening session of the three-day meeting, being attended by 150 delegates representing all branches of the Canadian fruit and vegetable industries.

"This system of itself alone, however, could not be expected to do more than to regulate the supply of any particular fruit or vegetable to meet the week-to-week demand based on foreign market invoice prices," the report said.

BRITAIN BACKS PLAN TO ATTRACT TOURISTS

LONDON, Feb. 5—(CP)—A drive to bring an unprecedented flow of tourists to Great Britain in 1947 is in the making, with backing from hotels, transportation companies, municipalities and the government.

In hopes of attracting heavy expenditures of foreign exchange, the Travel Association of Great Britain and Ireland is preparing a giant publicity campaign for 1946, chiefly in the form of moving pictures, the first of which will be released this spring.
