Player Pianos and Church Organs



Our Soldiers' Graves in France

Rev. John A. Cairns of Lantz, N.S., and Mrs. Cairns, recently visited the cemeteries of France in which our fallen soldiers are buried. In order to see the grave of their son who was killed in the battle of the Somme on his return to Canada, they proceeded in St. Catharines Church of which his cousin, Rev. R. G. Payne, is pastor, and gave an account of what he saw in the cemeteries which he visited. A very full report of Mr. Cairns' sojourn appeared in the "Newspaper Herald" from which we call a few sentences for the comfort of Canadian fathers and mothers, who lost sons in the Great War.

There are some 2,000 British War Cemeteries in France and 200 in Belgium. Some of these are very large; one near Ypres contains the graves of 15,000 British soldiers. Yet with the information obtainable from the War Graves Commission it is easy to find any grave among these thousands.

Mr. Cairns speaks in the highest terms of the work of the War Graves Commission in London in assisting visitors to locate the graves of their loved ones, and also of the assistance of the Y. M. C. A. in securing passports and tickets, directing visitors to trains and boats, furnishing motor cars in connection with their travels, and generally showing kindness and offering help to the strangers. "It is a good and gracious work in which they are engaged, and many good deeds have been performed by the kind ministrations of the Y. M. C. A. in this last sad duty to the fallen."

The War Graves Commission has been long and careful in identifying the soldier and has reached this decision, viz:—That all the arrangements of a cemetery are to be the same in size, 50 inches high and 15 inches wide. There is to be no distinction in the size of the stones of each man, whether a soldier or private, gave his all—his life—for his King and Country.

Mr. Cairns describes one of the cemeteries, which he says, "is the only church and cemetery combined and having seen one we know how the others are to be treated; for the same plan will be adopted for all, whether they are large or small. It is the noblest and the most perfect setting that any loved one could desire for their final home in a strange land. I wish I could find words to describe a finished cemetery. Think of a beautiful lawn close clipped, level as a floor, bound by a low wall of green hedges, with flowers and bushes, and in the center the white headstones are fixed, three feet apart, and while they form as well ordered a whole, they are not a regiment of soldiers, yet they are placed too closely together to resemble any other. Each stone is set in cement with flowers all around it, and has a greater height towards the feet of the grave. Through the center of the cemetery there is a broad and white path, bordered on one side with a line of beautiful flowers. At one end of the pathway is the "Stone of Remembrance," about six feet long, three feet high and 12 inches thick. On each side of the stone are the words, deeply cut and richly gilded in gold letters: "THEIR NAME LIVETH FOR EVER MORE."


"The Stone of Remembrance" is raised above the ground by two steps of cement foundation. At the other end of this white pathway stands the cross, about 12 feet high, with outside the arms as if shielding the departed ones; and on its side, reaching down from the top, is the sheathed sword. As to the plan of the cemetery, it is the finest thing that the mind of man can imagine. It is filled with an atmosphere that makes you very glad and yet very humble, and that gives you the thought so well expressed in the margin of each page of the King's Book at York, Minister: "They Died to Save Us."

Mr. Cairns is very helpful in the great and good fruits which the war will ultimately produce. "Having seen the week and ruin of the war and some of the cemeteries," he says, "I believe more firmly than ever that Christ, who holds the charter of life of universal empire, will bring, in His own way, some good out of all this horrible evil war. I believe that He will in ways unknown to us now, but which we shall see later on, overrule this awful war for the great future of His kingdom and that He will stand out in the eyes of the world more plainly than ever before, the Savior of mankind—the One to whom the eyes of the world are directed."

EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest for the 19th week of the contest, ending March 13th, 1922.

An extremely gratifying gain was made in the Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest, during the past week the production for the week being 450 as compared with 700 the total production for the previous week.

Mr. P. W. Woodley's pen of White Leghorns led far the week with a production of 41 eggs. Mr. J. B. Millman's pen of Barred Rocks was 2nd, with 19 eggs. Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns was 3rd, with 35 eggs, and Mr. R. W. Bulphitt's pen of White Leghorns was 4th, with 23 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 19 still leads the contest, with a production to date of 376 eggs; Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns and Mr. P. W. Woodley's pen of White Leghorns, third and fourth, with 252 eggs.

Total production to date is 3,912 eggs.


